WHY DO WE DO THAT?

From where do we get the Prayers of the People we've been using lately? Why aren't we using the Forms from the Book of Common Prayer?

Beginning in Advent of this liturgical year, we've been using season prayer forms that have been written by groups and individuals in the parish. With the 1979 revision of the <u>Book of Common Prayer</u>, the intent of the prayer book revisers was for the Prayers of the People to come directly from the people of the worshipping community. The rubrics governing those prayers can be found on page 359. The six Forms provided in the BCP were intended for use on extraordinary occasions when the congregation is unable to compose prayers for themselves.

I have asked various individuals and groups to compose prayers of the people specifically for our congregation, incorporating seasonal themes of concern. Beginning with the Second Sunday after Pentecost, and throughout the rest of the Season after Pentecost, we will use the Forms in the BCP. I have been impressed with the theological depth and the richness of the prayers that have been composed by our parishioners, and I would like to continue to use Prayers of the People of Holy Trinity from Advent through Holy Trinity Sunday each year. Please let me know if you would be interested in composing a seasonal setting for our Prayers of the People.

While we're on the topic of our weekly corporate prayers, I'd like to discuss the prayer requests that we collect before worship each Sunday. There is a book situated in the center of the Narthex (our fancy church word for entryway) that contains the Prayers of the People for each of our services. There are spaces provided for writing in your prayer concerns. Please feel free to write them into the book, so that our assigned Intercessor (our fancy church word for the person who reads the prayers) can read them aloud during the Prayers of the People. If you would be so kind as to include your name in the space provided, it will help us to track your requests and to reach out to you to pastorally.

Prayer, both corporate and individual, is one of the most important activities of any parish. It is my passionate dream that Holy Trinity will continue to be community of pray-ers, growing in faith and in the richness of our prayer lives. We include the prayer list from prior weeks in each announcement bulletin so that, if you feel called to do so, you can pray for the persons, churches, and concerns that have been shared by your brothers and sisters in Christ.

Palm Sunday


Parishioners started off outside with the blessing of the palms and procession into the church on a beautiful Palm Sunday.

Rogation Sunday

Rogation Sunday is May 21. Traditionally, Rogation Days are the three days before Ascension Day on which the litany is sung (or recited) in procession as an act of intercession. They originated in Vienne, France, in the fifth century when Bishop Mamertus introduced days of fasting and prayer to ward off a threatened disaster. In England they were associated with the blessing of the fields at planting. The vicar "beat the bounds" of the parish, processing around the fields reciting psalms and the litany. In the United States they have been associated with rural life and with agriculture and fishing. The propers in the BCP (pp. 207-208, 258-259, 930) have widened their scope to include commerce and industry and the stewardship of creation. The BCP also permits their celebration at other times to accommodate different regional growing seasons. ThThe term is from the Latin *rogatio*, meaning "asking."



EfM AT HOLY TRINITY



Education for Ministry is a wonderful program for anyone interested in exploring both personal and communal faith theologically and spiritually. It was developed at the School of Theology at Sewanee and has been a part of education at Holy Trinity for over 20 years. It is designed to promote deep and meaningful discussion for those wishing to live as believing, practicing Christians who are willing to look at questions both theological and cultural. The group is small, usually between 6 and 12, and embraces all seekers regardless of background or theological bent. The program unfolds over a period of four years, though students sign up for only one year at time.

Year one students study the Hebrew Scriptures, year two the New Testament, year three church history, and year four Christian theologies and other world religions. We have a group discussion as well, using methods of theological reflection to examine the role of faith, scripture, and tradition in our everyday decisions. We foster a safe and trusting atmosphere for exploration. If you are an EfM graduate, consider coming back to the group. The texts are new – not more big notebooks to carry around – and the discussion topics have been beautifully revised.

EfM meets on Mondays from 6:00 pm-8:30 pm, beginning the third week of August and ending the beginning of May. The tuition for 2017–2018 will be \$375 which includes all materials. Scholarships are usually available for those who need them. We will be recruiting new members in May and the first 3 weeks in June. There will be information about the program and registration forms in the Parish Hall after the Sunday services, and we will be happy to answer any questions. It is not possible to join this class mid-year, so be ready to register this spring if you are interested.

Highlights of Health Research*



Exercise (1) Older women with sedentary life styles had cells biologically 8 years older than their chronological ages. They had shorter telomeres and shorter telomeres are associated with heart disease, diabetes, and cancer. (2) Adults with arthritic hips, knees, or feet were studied. Those who got 45 minutes of activity per week were 80% more likely to sustain or improve physical function and gait speed. (3) Physical activity can decrease the risk of dying from breast cancer by about 40% and has the largest effect of any lifestyle factor on this outcome.

<u>Diabetes</u> Diabetes has moved up to the 3rd leading cause of death in the U.S.

<u>Laundry Detergent Packets and Eye Injuries</u> A total of 1201 cases of chemical eye injuries from laundry detergent packets (involving 3- and 4-year olds) were reported from 2010-2015.

<u>Use of Antibiotics</u> A Harris Poll and Health Day survey found that 69% of those polled had little or no knowledge that disease causing organisms develop resistance to antibiotics, rendering the antibiotics ineffective. 53% of those polled believed that antibiotics were effective in treating viral infections.

Obesity (1) A meta-analysis of 95 research studies found an association between obesity and cancer (including colon, breast, and kidney). (2) A study collecting data over 12 years found the overall risk of death (from any cause) increased by 10% in people who were overweight, by 34% in those who were obese, and by 98% in the morbidly obese.

<u>Hand Sanitizers</u> The Center for Disease Control (CDC) reported that hand sanitizers can be toxic to children 12 and younger. If ingested, alcohol-based sanitizers can cause seizures and coma.

<u>Cancer</u> (1) The risk of cancer can be decreased by avoiding smoke, screenings for colon and breast cancer, and the vaccine against human papilloma virus. Diet (American Institute for Cancer Research) and exercise are also important. (2) Researchers at the University of California in Los Angeles have developed a blood test to detect the presence, location, and type of cancer in patients.

Funding Students in Haiti

For some time a number of parishioners, led by Dr. Earl Burch, have been supporting university students in Haiti. The situation is best described by Earl's words:

"As most of you know, we have been supporting 15 Haitian university students from Cange. Most grew up in very poor families and have lost one or both parents. They will have no way to attend a university without our help. Several are in medical school. Others major in engineering, accounting, architecture, education, nursing, etc. We are their only hope to continue their educations. Here is a chance to make a real difference, "to love our neighbors as ourselves," to be good Samaritans, "to act in the world as the body of Christ."

Please help if you are able. Typically the cost for living and materials is \$300 per month. Tuition averages \$700-\$800 per year. Room rental is \$600 to \$1000 per year.

These are our children. They live in our village. They graduated from our school, Bon Sauveur. We are their role models. They badly need our love and care."

Donations were collected and sent straight to the students. The problem continued with each new term. So every three months, Earl appealed for more donations and had a system set up for sending funds directly to the students. However, this system is not sustainable on a long-term basis, and the students continue to need funds to support their studies.

In February, the Outreach Committee voted to use some of the funds allocated to the Committee by the Vestry to support these students. Subsequently the Vestry suggested that, in order to make the funding more sustainable, and to recognize the contributions Earl has made over the years to our mission in Haiti, Holy Trinity establish an educational fund to support the students. Any funds allocated for that purpose by the Outreach Committee will be paid into this fund, and parishioners are invited to make donations directly to the fund

At this time, donations are urgently needed to provide support for these students. If you have supported these students in the past or would like to start helping them now, please make a donation. Checks should be made payable to Holy Trinity. Please write "Haiti Educational Fund" on the memo line.

Rachel Mayo Recipient of New Clemson Professorship to Study Palliative Care for Narcotic-Dependent Newborns¹



Patients at risk of infections from surgical devices, newborns experiencing opioid withdrawal and people with Parkinson's disease stand to benefit from research stemming from Clemson University's 3 newest named professorships.

The Dr. Wallace R. Roy Distinguished Professorships appointments will support translational research partnerships between Clemson faculty members and Greenville Health System and other health system partners.

Dr. Rachel Mayo, a professor in Clemson's public health sciences department, will use the professorship to continue to expand her collaboration with Greenville Health System's Managing Abstinence in Newborns (MAiN) program, an early intervention model for babies born to opioid-dependent mothers. The program offers an innovative model of care that combines early treatment, rooming-in of babies and mothers at the hospital, interdisciplinary care and outpatient medication weaning, which combine to reduce the need for neonatal intensive care.

Mayo collaborates on the program with Jennifer Hudson, a physician in the GHS pediatrics department. Together, they are studying the health outcomes of babies who receive MAiN program care under Hudson at GHS, and compare those outcomes with those of babies who receive traditional care at hospitals around the state. They are also studying the safety, effectiveness and cost-savings potential of the program.

As a Roy Professor, Mayo will expand the research with Hudson to explore other areas of pediatric health, including breastfeeding and jaundice, the usefulness of the Ballard Score (a commonly used technique of gestational age assessment) and a curriculum design for medical students. Mayo and Hudson will also develop an application for a National Institutes of Health grant that would expand the MAiN program to hospitals outside South Carolina.

"The professorship will position our collaborative research team to move to the next level of nationally competitive research in neonatal health research, specifically mitigating the long-term consequences of opioid use that has emerged as a national crisis," Mayo said.
