

Why Do We Do That?

What are all those prayers at the beginning of our worship services? Why do we read so much Scripture? Do we have to have a sermon? What happens during the Eucharistic prayer? Why do we move around so much?

This is a bit of a different "Why Do We Do That?" this month. For three Sundays in January, I will preside over Instructed Eucharists. An Instructed Eucharist is pretty much what it sounds like: during the Holy Eucharist, there will be pauses in the action to explain what's going on: describing that part of the service, perhaps a bit of historical background, definitely an explanation of the theological significance. We'll provide written notes in the bulletins that complement or expand the spoken instruction.

Each of the three Sundays, I will provide instruction on one or more different parts of the Liturgy:

January 15–We will learn about Liturgy in general, the Entrance Rite, and the Sending Rite.

January 22–We will learn about the Liturgy of the Word.

January 29–We will learn about the Eucharistic Prayer(s).

On these Sundays, there will be a very abbreviated Sermon (because, as it turns out, it isn't optional), but I do not anticipate that the overall length of the service will be affected.


The Rose Window in Holy Trinity was dedicated to our Rector Emeritus, The Rev. Thomas C. Davis. A fund to help parishioners in need was established many years ago in the name of Tom's late wife, Fran Davis. You enjoy the chicken vegetable soup made from Fran's recipe at the Christmas bazaar each year. \$5 from the sale of each of these stained-glass ornaments is donated by ECW to the Fran Davis Memorial Fund. To date, we have donated \$950 to this fund.

The Last Supper (Passion) Window in Holy Trinity was dedicated to Evelyn Earle Goodman when it was installed. Evelyn was director of the Episcopal Day School from 1969 to when she retired in 1983. In honor of Evelyn, \$5 from the sale of each Last Supper ornament is donated by ECW to the Day School Scholarship Fund. To date, we have donated \$250 from the sale of this stained-glass ornament to the Day School.

Historic Preservation at St. Paul's CU Spring Semester Project



During the spring semester a team from the Graduate Program in Historic Preservation, co-sponsored by Clemson University and the College of Charleston, will be evaluating our historic St. Paul's Church as part of their spring semester elective curriculum.

The team consisting of six graduate students, and headed by Professor Amalia Leifeste, will focus on generating a Historic Structures Report (HSR). This report will define the current condition of St. Paul's Church, give treatment recommendations and preservation priorities, and produce a suggested maintenance plan. While providing valuable experience to the students, the HSR will serve as a benchmark and give us, at Holy Trinity Episcopal Parish, a tangible strategy in our continued stewardship of St. Paul's.

In preparation for their endeavor they have asked for our parishioners' assistance by providing their team with any historic details of St. Paul's, *i.e.* letters, photos, notes, or recollections of significant events or activities etc. If you have any such information, please share it. If electronic, send to davis2133@bellsouth.net. If a hard-copy, drop it my mailbox at the Holy Trinity Office. We will scan these and return them to you.

Ministers' Cook-Off Follow Up

This year's Ministers' Cook-Off raised a record \$11,800 for Safe Harbor. Safe Harbor operates 3 shelters serving Greenville, Anderson, Pickens and Oconee Counties. They also provide counseling services, safe relationship programs for teens, and transitional housing for women leaving abusive situations.



Holy Trinity Bazaar Artisan Market

The Holy Trinity Bazaar and Artisan Market was held on December 3 from 10 am to 2 pm. Mtr. Suz opened the event with a prayer at 9:50 am. We would like to take this opportunity to personally thank everyone who supported the bazaar. We all came together in friendship and fellowship with a common goal of using our gifts and talents to help those less fortunate than ourselves. After deducting donations of \$1040 from ornament sales during the year, the event raised \$10,764.65! (See "Did You Know" on page 7.) Charities that will benefit are the Clemson Free Clinic, Clemson Community Care, the Clemson Child Development Center, Family Promise, the Episcopal Day School, and Our Daily Bread.

We had great publicity including banners at Holy Trinity and St. Paul's. We had several newspaper articles and a *Facebook* page as well as information on the website www.holytrinitybazaar.org. Many thanks to all the parishioners who got the word out via social media.

We had a late start on everything because we could not find a chair for this year's event. In late August, Pat Geldard (ECW President) and Iris Reed (ECW Treasurer) decided to co-chair the bazaar in addition to their other obligations. We enlisted the help of Robbie Grider who was a tremendous asset in helping with all aspects of the bazaar (including drawing the very functional complete floor plan.) In an effort to avoid duplication, hopefully having enough Parish Hall space for everyone, and allowing more room for attendees to shop, we limited the number of indoor area artisans to 17. There were also 3 area vendors who set up tables outside as did the Holy Trinity Youth. Carlo Troise manned a table for Episcopal Relief and Development, and Beth Kunkel had a Haiti shop in the library.

We sincerely thank our Sexton, Jim Hylkema, for all he and Carlo Troise, Mac Wood, Henry Pate, Doug Grider, Joe Yanes, Jim Snowden, and Hap Wheeler did in moving tables from other areas of the church (during inclement weather) and back so that we did not have to spend funds renting any extra tables. New security procedures for the Day School presented a challenge the afternoon before the bazaar when the artisans were setting up their tables, but all went well thanks to Suzanne Watkins and the help of the parishioners who monitored the Parish Hall. Many thanks also to Jim Reed, Jack Davis, and Bill Purkerson for carrying 80 baskets from the Reed's basement and transporting them to the Parish Hall Saturday morning.

The silent auction this year was definitely the best ever! Thanks to so many good folks for all the items that were contributed! While we know we can never be able to list everyone who donated their time and talents, we would like to extend a huge thank you to the Holy Trinity parishioners who worked so hard for many months making items for our booths. Also, we sincerely appreciate all the parishioners who just showed up and said "What can we do to help?" They once again this year, as for past bazaars, are our "champions."
