KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

My Dear Friends in Christ,

When I arrived here in mid-2016, the primary document that described Holy Trinity's aspiration was the Vision 2020 that was created in 2012. The Vision 2020 document described the high hopes and very possible dreams that the parish held dear in that moment. The document describes Holy Trinity's specific goals for "**a parish growing: a diverse, dynamic church worshipping within the Episcopal tradition; a church forming and re-forming: a loving family nurturing faith across generations; a family sustaining: a communion bound in one another by the sacred intimacy of sharing joys and sorrows; and a communion giving: a parish joined to our community and our world, in charity, and in hope.**"

Holy Trinity's Vision 2020 provides specific goals for Liturgy, Christian Formation, Pastoral Care, Outreach, Trinity Place, Canterbury, St. Paul's, and the Episcopal Day School. In each of these areas, some of those goals have been met, some are in progress, and some are still to be addressed.

When the 2020 Vestry meets for the first time in February at our Vestry Retreat, I will ask the Vestry to assess each of these areas. We will then begin to formulate a vision to carry forth the mission and ministry of Holy Trinity in light of the goals accomplished and the goals that are still unfulfilled. We will start that work at the Vestry level and spread it out through the various committees and groups that are already engaged with each aspect of ministry at Holy Trinity. At some point, I hope that each person in the parish is called upon and responds actively to at least one opportunity to engage in the mission of this parish: **to love with the heart of Christ, to think with the mind of Christ, and to act in the world as the Body of Christ.**

BE TRANSFORMED: A HOLY EXPERIMENT

African Bible Study Method—*lectio divina in Community**

This month, I'm inviting you to continue the *lectio divina* practice introduced last month, the African Bible Study Method. There are suggested readings provided in the *Be Transformed Workbook*. Copies are available in the church office, or you can get one in the Adult Sunday School class on 2/9, where we will use this practice to reflect on the appointed Gospel for the day.

Lectio divina means, quite simply "holy reading." *Lectio divina* encompasses a variety of methods for reading our Holy Scriptures prayerfully, with the intention of listening for the Word (the mind, the will, the person of God in Jesus Christ) in our hearts, minds, and imaginations. In listening, it is always important to pay attention to physical sensations, "random" thoughts, and emotional responses to what we are hearing.

Opening Prayer: O Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning. Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our savior Jesus Christ. *Amen.*

1. Read the passage slowly.
2. Identify word or phrase that catches their attention (1 minute).
3. Each shares the word or phrase around the group (3-5 minutes, no discussion).
4. Another person reads the passage slowly (from a different translation if possible).
5. Each person identifies where this passage touches their life today (1 minute).
6. Each shares (3-5 minutes, no discussion).
7. Passage is read a third time (another reader and translation if possible).
8. Each person names or writes "From what I've heard and shared, what do I believe God wants me to do or be? Is God inviting me to change in any way?" (5 minutes)
9. Each person shares their answer (5-10 minutes, no discussion)

Each prays for the person on their right, naming what was shared in the other steps (5 minutes).

Close with the Lord's Prayer.

**This method of lectio divina may be adapted quite easily for individual use by responding to each reading in writing. It is important, however, to read the Scripture passage aloud.*

Highlights of Health Research*



Drugs Affecting Microbiome of Gut—Eighteen commonly used drugs; including proton pump inhibitors, metformin, antibiotics, and laxatives; can alter the gut microbiome (bacterial community). The alteration can cause digestive problems, including diarrhea. [Gastroenterology](#).

Effect of Screen Time on Literacy and Language—Preschoolers with high ScreenQ scores (excess screen time) had reduced structural integrity of white matter in the brain areas involved with literacy and language, compared with more well-developed white matter among those with lower ScreenQ scores. Researchers also found a strong connection between higher ScreenQ scores and poorer emerging literacy, expressive language, and rapid object-naming skills. [JAMA Pediatrics](#).

Loneliness and Death—Patients (average age, mid 60's) who reported feeling lonely were more likely to die within a year after hospitalization compared with their peers who didn't feel lonely. More than 13,400 heart patients were studied to find higher odds of depression, anxiety, and lower quality of life among those who reported being lonely. [Heart](#).

Nighttime Eating and Health—A study by Columbia University researchers, to be presented at the American Heart Association's annual meeting, found that women who ate more of their daily calories in the evenings were more prone to having higher body mass index, higher blood pressure and poorer long-term blood glucose control.

Laxatives/Diet Pills and Eating Disorders—Young women and girls who try to control their weight with laxatives and diet pills may be at a higher risk for eating disorders. Researchers found 4.2% of those who used laxatives and 1.8% who used diet pills were subsequently diagnosed with an eating disorder, compared with 0.8% who didn't use laxatives and 1% who did not use diet pills. [American Journal of PUBLIC Health](#)

Noise and Risk of Cardiovascular Disease—Researchers associated every 5-decibel gain in environmental noise exposure with 34% higher odds of major adverse cardiovascular events, such as strokes and heart attacks. [European Heart Journal](#).

Aspirin and All-Cause Mortality—Researchers found that older adults who took aspirin at least three times weekly had 15% lower odds of cancer-related death and 19% reduced likelihood of all-cause mortality, compared with those who didn't take aspirin. The findings in [JAMA Network Open](#) also linked aspirin use to 34% and 28% lower risk of colon and gastrointestinal cancer-related mortality, respectively, among those who were overweight.

Coffee and Chronic Kidney Disease—Coffee may protect against chronic kidney disease (CKD) and albuminuria, according to a study in the [American Journal of Kidney Diseases](#). Researchers did not determine which ingredients in coffee may provide the benefits but suggested non-caffeine chemicals may be a factor because they reduce inflammation and oxidative stress, which are associated with CKD onset and progression.

Green Tea and Life Expectancy—Researchers tracked 100,902 Chinese adults with no history of stroke, heart attack or cancer for about seven years and found that those who reported drinking green tea at least three times per week could expect at age 50 that their lives would be 1.26 years longer than that of their peers who did not regularly consume green tea. Regular green tea drinkers were 20% less likely to develop heart disease and 22% less likely to die from stroke. [European Journal of Preventive Cardiology](#).

Obesity and Cancer—Research found increasing rates of cancer in men and women under age 50, and researchers suggested obesity may be a key factor. [Canadian Medical Association](#).

THE "GOOD SHEPHERD FUND"

The Vestry and Clergy wish to communicate that Holy Trinity has established a confidential Good Shepherd Fund to be administered by the Pastoral Care Committee in conjunction with our Clergy. The purpose of this Fund is to provide confidential financial assistance in response to emergencies or financial hardship among any of our parishioners.

The program is well-defined, including proper oversight and guidelines for its operation, with full accountability to the Vestry. If any parishioner has such a financial emergency, they are to contact the Rector or Pastoral Care Committee directly, in confidence. Contributions to the Fund will be accepted from generous parishioners and others, but cannot be earmarked for any specific purposes. Confidentiality regarding recipients of funds is strictly maintained.

QUIET TIME WITH GOD IN THE CHAPEL

Take a break with God on Monday mornings. The chapel at Holy Trinity is always open, and all are welcome to stop by and pray at any time. On Monday mornings, any who wish to gather for quiet, contemplative time with God can come together for reflective reading of Scripture and short periods of prayer and meditation.

The leadership of this practice will be shared by clergy and lay participants. We will gather at 11:15 am and conclude by 11:45. All are welcome.




MID-WEEK HOLY EUCHARIST



Of each \$10 purchase only \$3 goes toward processing, shipping and handling while \$4 goes directly back to the farmers and \$3 goes to support our Haiti University students (most of whom are from the Cange area!).



CREATION CARE—COMPOSTING PROGRAM



Beginning February 9, Holy Trinity will officially become subscribers with Compost House, a commercial composting service. We have been piloting this program for a month or so to gauge our potential usage and receptivity. Thank you for your support during our pilots; we have diverted several hundred pounds of food waste from the landfill!

Compost House will provide us with buckets and liners for food waste—all paper products used in our food service and all foods served can be composted. Plastics and foil can be recycled. Items like cocoa mix packages will need to go into the trash. We will also begin to collect paper towels in the restrooms on the main level of the parish house and in the

office to be composted. We will use compostable liners in those wastebaskets to facilitate collection and add small wastebaskets for items other than paper towels.

As part of our service, Compost House will pick up our buckets and paper towel bags every 2 weeks and deliver finished compost for our gardens.

Using a commercial composting service allows us to compost animal products (including bones); paper plates, cups, and waxed papers, and compostable “plastic” cups that do not break down in home composting systems. So, there is no need to establish different “waste streams.” If it comes from the earth and we can eat it, it is compostable. And, we do not have to devote space to a composter.

We know we still have work to do on logistics and education and will begin that work right away; expect signage and other communications. But, to give you an idea of the potential impact, Grace Episcopal in Anderson diverted nearly 2500 pounds of material from the landfill in their first quarter with Atlas Organics, the parent company of Compost House!

RECYCLING AT HOLY TRINITY

Thanks so much to kitchen volunteers who have reinvigorated our recycling program in 2019! We hope to make sure that we recycle as much as we can in 2020 and as seen directly above, we also plan to introduce composting!

We can easily expand our efforts to include Sunday school, E/M, choirs, and all other users of our spaces. All anyone has to do to recycle in the city of Clemson is to put plastic containers, glass, metal cans, paper or paperboard loose into one of the green BINS in the kitchen or next to the playground. It will not be recycled if it is in a plastic bag. For now, we need to take recyclables out ourselves as we institutionalize the process.

Plastic bags, including zipper-top bags, can be recycled at local supermarkets--please do not place them in the trash or leave them in the kitchen. Thanks for your help and let's expand our efforts to move toward zero-waste. Stay tuned! Thank you!
