KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of faith. Galatians 6:9-10

Dear Ones,

The Bible verses above were part of the Daily Office reading for the last Monday in November, and as soon as I heard it, I knew this would be the epitaph for my December letter to the Parish. I had just returned from a week's vacation, during which I was moderately successful in leaving my cares and concerns behind. The one care that I could not leave behind, because reminders are everywhere and a necessary part of our lives right now, is the concern for the health and well being of parishioners in this time of pandemic. Even as I was refreshed by a change of scenery, the news of the ubiquity of community spread throughout our state was ever-present.

As I write this letter, the two week average of positive tests in Pickens County is 21.1%, Anderson is at 22.1%, Oconee is at 17.7%, and Greenville at 18.4%. These numbers are an indication that we must remain diligent in following public health and diocesan guidelines, as well as considering our parish context. For the month of December, we will continue to worship outdoors as we are able and to provide online worship for those who need to remain at home. This includes Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services. The schedule for those services is provided on page 4 in this issue of *Tempo*.

For now, I want to continue with a word of hope and encouragement. This Advent, we await not only the coming of our Lord but also of approved and effective vaccines for this dread virus that has disrupted our lives so thoroughly this year. It seems that those vaccines are on the horizon, and that is good news. It may take a while for the quantity of vaccine to allow for general distribution, so we must not grow weary in doing what is right. We must work for the good of all.

The good news is that doing what is right is not *hard* work. It is actually quite simple: wear a mask, practice good health hygiene, stay home if you don't feel well or have been exposed to the virus, and, in either of those cases, refrain from contact with others until you have quarantined for 14 days or received a negative test result. And, please, if you do get sick, let us know so that we can pour out our love for you and support you in whatever way you find helpful. Call me, call the church office, call your Neighborhood Group Pastoral Care Leader—just call! If nothing else, we would love to send you a card or safely deliver flowers or a meal.

This year is almost over (and that is a blessing, in and of itself!). Let's finish strong, taking care of each other and working for the good of all. In the words of one of my favorite Taizè chants, Ubi caritas, "Live in charity and steadfast love. God will dwell with you." My prayer for us all is that we will not grow weary, but will find the strength to live in charity and steadfast love until this terrible ordeal is over. My prayer for each of you is that you will be confident that you are not alone, there is always someone to bring light into the darkness for you. My prayer for the world is that we will find ways to work together for the good of all. God bless you all and keep you safe and well.

HOW IS HOLY TRINITY ORGANIZED FOR MINISTRY DURING A PANDEMIC (AND BEYOND)?

Perhaps the best way to answer that question is to offer an example: In October, a group of parish friends* came up with the idea of providing Thanksgiving dinner to parishioners whose plans to be with family were disrupted by the pandemic. They approached the Engagement Ministry Team with the idea, and the response was, "Let's see what we need to do to make it happen safely." The Engagement Team brought in our resident kitchen manager, who made sure the cupboards were stocked with supplies and provided guidance on preparing and serving the meal safely. The church office provided support in the form of communicating the meal. The result was that close to 40 people were served in one way or another, and the meal was spectacularly delicious!

Holy Trinity is organized by Teams (or Committees) into roughly thirteen areas of ministry: Adult Formation, Buildings & Grounds, Canterbury, Communications, Engagement & Fellowship, Episcopal Day School, Family Ministry, Finance & Administration, Outreach, Stewardship, and Worship Support. These areas may include several subgroups; Worship Support includes Acolytes, Altar Guild, Choir, Lay Readers, Ushers, and representatives of each worshiping community. These subgroups organize themselves for ministry, and the leaders meet regularly to coordinate and plan worship services. The church office provides support by providing access to the printer/copier, facilitating communication between the groups, ordering supplies, and in other ways as needed.

Each Ministry Team has one or more member of the Vestry assigned as a liaison between the Ministry Team and the Vestry. The Vestry Liaison does not necessarily serve as the Ministry Team's chair, although that does happen sometimes. Ideally, the Vestry Liaison works with the chair to report to the Vestry the Ministry Team's challenges and successes. This interaction helps the Vestry to determine the best practices for supporting each Team materially and in prayer.

Holy Trinity's Ministry Teams exist to support the ministry to which each member of the parish is called by Baptism—to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ, to seek and serve Christ in all persons, and to strive for justice and peace among all people. I encourage each of you to pray to God for guidance in discerning how you are called to fulfill your baptismal vows. When God has answered your prayer, reach out to the Vestry liaison or Ministry Team chair in the area that seems most appropriate. Or reach out to Noah or me for further guidance. The leadership of this parish exists to help you find your connection with your call to ministry and to support you in fulfilling that call.

The needs for Holy Trinity's ministry amongst parishioners and in the world are too great to leave to the few who step forward for leadership. We need each minister (that's you) to be part of our work of loving with the heart of Christ, thinking with the mind of Christ, and acting in the world as the Body of Christ.

FROM THE ASSISTANT TO THE RECTOR

WHY DO WE DO THAT?: CHANTING THE GOSPEL

"The person who sings, prays twice" is a saying often attributed to St Augustine. Throughout Christian history, different people have had different opinions about whether and how Christians should sing and how much, but in general we have always recognized that music is an important and useful part of how we relate to God. It requires the concentration of both our body and our mind, and music has a way of getting the knowledge of God's love and presence in our world down into our souls in a way that seeing or speaking words on a page simply doesn't. One of the pieces of advice that the Roman Catholic scholar of worship Aidan Kavanagh gave his students was, "Celebrations are sung." When we gather to worship God, we are engaging in an action that is fundamentally a celebration of the gifts of God's presence in the Word, and often a celebration of the gifts of the Sacraments. How can we keep from singing?

Praying twice and singing as we celebrate are two wonderful reasons that during this Christmastide I will be chanting the Gospel reading at our worship services. The Gospel has always been seen as the beating heart of Scripture for Christians, hence its place as the last reading at any service. In ancient times (and still in a few places if you know where to look), the entire service was sung except for the sermon, but it is not uncommon to find parishes at least in the Episcopal Church that chant the Gospel as a nod to its centrality in our worship.

I remember last Christmas Eve I was visiting a parish that used this tradition. As the priest sang the famous prologue to John and came to the words "a light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it," a smile crossed her face as we all heard it in a different way that night. With 2020 mostly in hindsight I hear it differently again in my mind's ear. What will you hear this year?

"THE STORY OF GOD'S LOVING PURPOSE": LESSONS AND CAROLS



Lessons and Carols (or "A Festival Service of Nine Lessons and Carols for Christmas") is arguably the greatest Anglican contribution to the traditions of western Christian worship after Choral Evensong. Even so, it is a relatively new tradition, dating only from the 1880s, when an English bishop decided he wanted his cathedral to offer a form of Christmas Eve worship that was appealing enough to entice people away from the pubs. How far we've come since then! The tradition spread across England and even began to make its way to the United States, but the service really came into its own in 1918 when the structure was adapted for use by the Choir of King's College in Cambridge, England, and spread even more in popularity when the BBC began to broadcast the King's College service worldwide in the 1920s. Today it can be found even beyond the Episcopal Church in the United States and in recent years some churches have begun to take on a counterpart service for the Advent season. You can find more information about our version of it in the 2018 *Book of Occasional Services*, available online for free.

This year, this beloved tradition is moving online in many places, including here at Holy Trinity, which means it is possible for you to partake in the different expressions of this tradition from around the country and even the world from the comfort of your home; I hope you'll have a look if you're interested. The much-beloved King's College service will air live on South Carolina Public Radio on Christmas Eve at 10 am and our Chancel Choir is hard at work preparing our own service for broadcast on Christmas Eve at 7 pm. I hope you'll join us.

COMPLINE: BEDTIME PRAYERS FOR US ALL

Nightly prayer time on our Facebook page began in mid-March as a way to connect and provide a sense of closure to each day during the lock-down, when our days seemed to melt together into a timeless goo. As the weeks went by, a small and faithful group of worshipers began to form into a community of prayer. People from around the diocese and around the country join us each night to ask for prayers and to settle their hearts for the night. We gather each night at 8:25 pm to prepare for this brief service of prayer, honoring the saints as they are appointed in Lesser Feasts and Fasts, with Compline beginning at about 8:30 pm. Compline lasts about 15 minutes, including time to read our parish prayer list and other names and needs that are requested.



WORSHIP CHANGES

We will continue to worship outdoors in our sacred space, Trinity Place, for the foreseeable future. We moved the time of that service to 2:00 pm on October 25 and will keep that time until further notice. We will meet as often as the weather allows (the Worship Support Team declared that it will be too cold "when it snows"). Come when you feel safe doing so.


If you don't feel safe coming to in-person worship, please join us online at 10:30 each Sunday. We are changing up our online service from Morning Prayer to Ante-Communion, which is the churchy way of saying that we will follow the Liturgy of the Word from our Holy Eucharist liturgy. There are a couple of reasons for this change: this liturgy allows Noah the opportunity to fulfill his liturgical ministry as a deacon, and it allows us to plan for more fulsome expressions of our liturgical seasons. The latter is rather important as we approach All Saints', Advent, and Christmas.

EUCHARISTIC VISITS

Knowing that there will be quite a few parishioners who do not feel comfortable or safe coming to church yet, Deacon Noah and Mtr. Suz will be available to bring Holy Communion to your homes. We will share the Body and the Blood from Holy Trinity's outdoor altar, observing careful distancing and masking. The preference is to conduct these Eucharistic Visits outdoors, as much as possible.

FORWARD DAY BY DAY Daily Devotions for Disciples

You can pick up your November/December/January Forward Day by Day devotional in the church office or the chapel (just don't go past the rope or you will set off the alarm!) These booklets are also available as you enter our in-person worship services at Trinity Place.

CHILDREN'S SUNDAY SCHOOL

In-person Sunday school will take place on the 3rd Sunday of every month, during the 2 pm in-person church service outside, using social distancing, masks and hygienic practices. The lessons will be about 30 minutes. Our meetings will be located at Trinity Place. We are committed to being flexible, safe and communicative under the constraints of the ongoing pandemic. Please arrive a few minutes ahead of 2 pm, so that we can gather into our respective groups. Each leader will have a sign indicating where each group will meet. The groups are: pre-K (3 and 4 years), Godly Play (K—2nd grade), Faith Travelers (3rd—5th grades), Middle School (6th—8th grades) and High school (9th—12th grade).



ADVENT SUNDAY

Most Advent events were held after the 2 pm service at Holy Trinity on Advent Sunday, November 29. Fellowship was open to all and included cider and cookies individually packaged for families, Advent wreath kits, picture coloring for delivery to The Clemson Downs, collection of canned goods for Clemson Community Care and an Advent Care Package for all K – 12th grade families to take home and enjoy throughout Advent.












ADVENT EVENT


