KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation, who says to Zion, "Your God reigns." (Isaiah 52:7)

Dear Ones,

On Christmas Day, I had the occasion to ponder the character and the qualities of the Good News. I also pondered, and continue to ponder, why and how we are called to bring this Good News. As I pondered these things, I was reminded, of all things, of a series of advertisements for a telecommunications company whose tagline is "Just okay is not okay." When people are in any sort of need or trouble, when they need serious help, just okay is not okay. We are not called to bring Okay News, we are called to bring Good News. Not just any good news—THE Good News that God reigns.

Okay news is not okay when we are all living in a world wrapped in darkness. The Good News we hope to bring to the people who walk in darkness is that God loves each one of us, and all of us collectively--so much that okay news doesn't begin to express that love. The Word became flesh and dwelt among us for so much more than the survival of our souls after death. The Good News is that Jesus Christ, the only begotten son of God gave us power to become children of God. Living in the power to become children of God is so much more than mere survival! The Good News for us is that God wants us—God wants the whole world—to thrive and flourish.

For that to happen, someone has to announce peace, someone must bring good news—not just okay news, but truly good news. Someone must announce salvation, and say to the world, "God reigns." That is our part in the Good News: preparing food and providing human contact for those who are alone in this terrible year of separation and isolation, as we did on Christmas Day. It is acknowledging and striving to heal the divisions that have become so evident in our community and in our nation (pretending that they don't exist among us will not make them go away). It is finding new ways to open our doors to the community, new ways to gather for worship, new ways to be Good News.

In this introspective time at the beginning of a New Year, I ask you to think about and make a plan for bringing the wonderful News of God's love to someone who is hungry—not just for food, but for God's love. What is the impact of God's love in your own life? What difference does it make that this Good News comes from God and from your brothers and sisters in Christ? How can you share *that* Good News with your neighbor? How will you carry the message of hope to someone who is alone and lonely or floundering in pain and sorrow? How will you proclaim the righteousness of justice and peace in our community or in our nation?

Instead of planning for self-improvement this year, why don't we all plan for bringing Good News wherever and whenever we can? I mean to follow this horrible year with a year of proclaiming to all the ends of the earth the Good News that God loves the world. I aim to have the beautiful feet of that messenger of peace and righteousness. Don't you want to have beautiful feet, too?

We are still working out the details of how many people can safely attend, but in any case, the service will be streamed online so as many of you can attend as you like! EPIPHANY HOME BLESSINGS



A few years ago after Eucharist on the Feast of the Epiphany (January 6), I stood on a chair in front of the door of my home with my rector and other housemates gathered around, as I used chalk to write a blessing on the mantle and we said a prayer over the home for the coming year.

Epiphany is a season when we consider the ways that Christ's light shines in the world around us, both into and from our hearts. For centuries it has been customary for Christians to have their houses blessed during the season after Epiphany and to mark their homes as a place where Christ's light dwells and where evil has no place.

This year on the Feast of the Epiphany, Mother Suz will bless chalk at our Canterbury Eucharist, with plenty of extra for members of the parish pick up on the following Sunday or from the parish office. We'll include a short prayer for you and anyone you live with to bless your home in this way.

As we turn the page on 2020, I hope you'll join us in this practice of claiming your home as a place where Christ's light dwells in 2021.

WORSHIP CHANGES

We will continue to worship outdoors in our sacred space, Trinity Place, for the foreseeable future. We moved the time of that service to 2:00 pm on October 25 and will keep that time until further notice. We will meet as often as the weather allows (the Worship Support Team declared that it will be too cold "when it snows"). Come when you feel safe doing so.

If you don't feel safe coming to in-person worship, please join us online at 10:30 each Sunday. We are changing up our online service from Morning Prayer to Ante-Communion, which is the churchy way of saying that we will follow the Liturgy of the Word from our Holy Eucharist liturgy. There are a couple of reasons for this change: this liturgy allows Noah the opportunity to fulfill his liturgical ministry as a deacon, and it allows us to plan for more fulsome expressions of our liturgical seasons.

EUCHARISTIC VISITS

Knowing that there will be quite a few parishioners who do not feel comfortable or safe coming to church yet, Deacon Noah and Mtr. Suz will be available to bring Holy Communion to your homes. We will share the Body and the Blood from Holy Trinity's outdoor altar, observing careful distancing and masking. The preference is to conduct these Eucharistic Visits outdoors, as much as possible.



Please call Sheryl at the church office to request a visit. She will inform the clergy, and one of us will be in touch to schedule an appointment.


CHILDREN'S SUNDAY SCHOOL


ATTENTION MINISTRY LEADERS!

Location: Clemson Fire Substation 740 Isaqueena Trail Central SC 29630

Hours: 7 - 11 am, Monday through Friday Test type: Saliva PCR (not rapid antigen)

Cost: FREE!

For whom: This test site is for members of the Clemson Community. Important-if you are a university employee or a Clemson student it is very important that you use the test site at Memorial Stadium and not the Community Site

Instructions:

- 1) You must register prior to arrival to receive a QR code. Have this ready on your phone for scanning or print this on paper to present at test site. Your QR code can be used as many times in the future as needed without re-registering.
- 2) Nothing to eat or drink 30 min prior to test.
- 3) Results will come usually within 24-30 hours occasionally sooner via text and email.

Accurate, timely testing is a powerful tool to help a community turn the tide of COVID-19 locally. The Clemson Community COVID Testing project aims to make this convenient for you and is free. This is an unbelievable opportunity.

Consider testing for these reasons:

- 1) Test to diagnose illness if you have symptoms of any viral illness COVID can present in many ways
- 2) Test due to a possible close contact exposure to COVID-19. CDC supports being released from the 2 week quarantine early on day 7 from exposure if you have a negative test on day 5,6, or later from known exposure. This allows you to return to work and life sooner in most cases. Pickens County School district is strongly encourage to update it's quarantine for exposure policies.
- 3) TEST BEAUSE YOU CAN! -this is the most powerful opportunity.

This illness continues to spread in large part because of individuals being very contagious with an asymptomatic illness or spreading it to others while in the "pre-symptomatic" phase before symptoms begin.

IN THE SO ALL MAY EAT (SAME) GARDEN

The SAME garden in flourishing in its new environment. You can see the garden from the lawn area where the 2 pm Sunday services are held.

Our SAME garden continues to thrive and we have shared over 5 pounds of greens with CCC in the last month. Right now, the turnip and mustard greens are perfect for harvesting and will continue to be available through early February.

We have 2 varieties of turnip greens—purple top white globe turnips and seven top turnips.

The purple top turnips are in two of the long beds; you can see the purple tops of the turnips sticking out of the ground. This variety dates back to 1880 and is a very commonly grown turnip. The seven top turnip is in one pf the taller beds. This variety dates back over 200 years and is unique in the turnip world because it does not produce an edible root.





The variety of mustard greens we are growing in one of the taller beds is southern giant curled. This is also an heirloom variety and is one of the most commonly grown varieties. To harvest, cut leaves from around the outside of the plant. The leaves in the center will continue to grow and produce more to harvest. To pull turnips, hold the turnip itself and pull straight up. It is best to remove the leaves soon after pulling, otherwise they continue to draw moisture from the root. I store greens in the refrigerator in a partially open plastic bag with a bit of wet paper towel so they don't wilt. The greens should last a week or more and the turnips for a few weeks. Beets and cabbages will be next to harvest.

CHURCH OFFICE OPERATIONS

Dear Ones,

It has been a while since I've written a mid-week letter to you all. It is on behalf of the office staff that I am writing to you now. The stark fact is that the spread of the virus in the Upstate has increased rapidly through November and into December, with no sign of slowing down. At the same time, the number of visitors to the church office has increased significantly over the course of the fall. Two of our staff members are caregivers for medically fragile family members. I am asking you all to refrain from coming to the church office to conduct business unless it is absolutely necessary until the transmission rates improve significantly. Most business can be conducted by phone or by email. If you need to drop off or pick up items from church, please call ahead to make arrangements for a no-contact or low-contact exchange.

Once the community "opened up" to some degree, and the virus still seemed far off, the sense of urgency eased up a bit. Then the life of the parish picked back up to some degree. Your church staff returned to the church office, although we've maintained strict adherence to masking and distancing requirements. Most of our interactions with each other occur by phone or by Zoom, even though we are just down the hall from one another. We recently cancelled our plans for a distanced Christmas lunch because of our concerns for each other.

We love you all, and we miss you very much. Not a day goes by that we don't mourn the loss of our face-to-face contact with you. All of us in the church office, as well as the Wardens, Vestry, and ministry leaders, continue to monitor the situation and make adjustments, as necessary. Our primary concern is to keep each of us safe, to the best of our ability. Our secondary concern is to maintain our connection with each of you. We will continue to seek creative and life-giving ways to do both.

It is of utmost importance that we protect one another for a while longer. Hope is on the horizon, and we will get through this awful pandemic. I believe that it will be several more months before we can claim a return to some sense of normalcy. Please, *please* follow the recommendations of health-care professionals and scientists for a while longer: stay home as much as possible, maintain at least 6 feet of distance between yourself and others who are not part of your household, wear a mask, and wash your hands often. Take care, and stay well.
