KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

My Dear Friends in Christ,

We have endured much in the year since the novel coronavirus emerged as a global threat. The very real existential danger posed by the pandemic exposed fault lines in the cohesion of our identity as Americans that were already there, but easy for many of us to ignore or dismiss as overwrought political rhetoric. Even our Christian identity has been tested and questioned. Some say we live in unfaithful fear as we take measures to protect members of our worshiping community and our neighbors. Some say it is too political to preach the Gospel as an urgent message to love God and love neighbor by holding ourselves, each other, and our society accountable for the degree to which our actions and words line up with the Great Commandment.

Accountability is an important ingredient in our common life—as Americans and as Christians. Impassioned dissent against the actions that violate the norms embedded in our worldview is part of our national and denominational heritage and have often moved us along an incremental path of social justice and common understanding. However, when accountability and dissent are replaced with shaming and dehumanizing the "other side," constructive debate becomes destructive conflict. This is a trajectory that we have seen played out over the course of the election cycle that has just culminated in a peaceful transfer of authority that was shockingly uncertain until the end of the festivities.

I believe with all my heart that the Church has a role to play in healing the wounds of the extreme political division that we have all suffered. I believe that we are called specifically to the task of protecting the dignity of every single person. Have you ever wondered where we got the idea that each human being has dignity? In the first chapter of Genesis, we hear God make an astonishing claim: "And God created human beings in God's image, in the image of God they were created." Each person you encounter has inherent dignity because he, she, or they are created in the image and likeness of God. Bearing the fingerprints of God in our deepest being, we are responsible for human flourishing. Shaming and dehumanizing are antithetical to our identity as followers of Jesus. Holding thoughts in our hearts and speaking words that characterize "our side" as completely good and "their side" as utterly evil is the first step toward an ungodly hatred of one of God's children.

Working with Braver Angels to heal political divisions and committing ourselves to Becoming Beloved Community are two of the tools that we can use as a parish to build bridges to a healthier future. We don't have specific plans for continuing our work with Braver Angels at this time, but watch for announcements in the future. We do have specific plans for Becoming Beloved Community; our Lenten program this year will be a five-week curriculum developed for The Episcopal Church to "organize our many efforts to respond to racial injustice and grow a community of reconcilers, justice-makers, and healers." You can read the specifics of this Lenten program on page 10 of this *Tempo*. I hope that you will take time this Lent to pray and meditate on ways that you—and we, the Church—might become better bearers of Christ's healing light and love in the world.

WHAT IS THE MEANING OF THE ASTERISK (*) IN EACH VERSE OF THE PSALMS IN THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER?

An explanation of the asterisk in the verses of psalms is found on page 583 in the BCP, in a section "Concerning the Psalter." This section of twopages-and-change contains a wealth of information about the use of psalms in worship, including the instruction that psalms should be read verse-by-verse (never by half-verse!). "An asterisk divides each verse into two parts for reading or chanting. *In reading, a distinct pause should be made at the asterisk*." (The emphasis here is mine.)

This practice of the distinct pause at the asterisk seems to have been overlooked in most of the worshiping communities I've encountered. The first time I experienced it was at St. Mary's Convent in Sewanee a few years before I entered seminary on The Mountain. I was on a retreat at the Conference Center adjacent, and joined the nuns for Morning and Evening Prayer for a few days. The night I arrived, during Evening Prayer, when we started the Psalm appointed for that service, I blasted right through the distinct pause. Mine was the sole voice, disconcertingly loud in the distinct pause. The sisters were most tolerant and kind, so I didn't see a single side-eye thrown my way. I thought at the time that this must be a "Benedictine thing" and didn't ponder any further.

When I arrived at the School of Theology some time later, our incoming class was instructed in the ways of the Customary of the seminary's chapel (a Customary is a document that has all the instructions for worshiping according to the customs of the local community—or a bishop). One of the first things the Sub-Dean of the Chapel of the Apostles did was to rehearse us in observing the distinct pause at the asterisk. We were later quizzed on the various other instructions in "Concerning the Psalter."

During my time of worshiping in the Chapel of the Apostles, I came to appreciate the distinct pause at the asterisk for two reasons. First, this practice promotes attention to the text—you fall into a habit of reading carefully as you watch for the asterisk! Second, this practice promotes listening in community. There are many portions of all our liturgies that are prayed in unison. Paying attention to the pace and rhythm of the united voices is a spiritual practice of communion—not the Sacrament, but a union of breath, voice, and heartbeat as we pray together.

Beginning on Ash Wednesday (2/17), Noah and I are going to model this way of reading the psalms in worship. There will be a rubric included in each bulletin to remind the congregation to pause at the asterisk. The pause will last for just a second or two. It may be awkward to catch the rhythm at first, but it quickly becomes natural. Just listen for the shared breath-timing and heartbeat of the congregation. When we worship together, a secret to that hearing is to pray at a volume that is audible to yourself and the person next to you, and no louder than that. It is enough to maintain the communal rhythm, and God can hear your prayer just fine! And please don't stress about getting it just right. The aim is not perfection; the aim is communion with God and one another as we pray.

FROM THE ASSISTANT TO THE RECTOR


As I write this, my ordination to the priesthood is fast approaching! I look forward to sharing the day with you via the livestream that you will be able to find at **edusc.org/live**. Ordinations are a rare but joyful occasion in the life of many Episcopalians, when we celebrate God's faithfulness in raising up ordained leaders to carry on the work of sharing God's gifts and promises to us through the preaching of the Gospel and sharing of the sacraments of Baptism and Eucharist. An ordination is not a celebration of the person being ordained; it is a celebration of God's work through the Church and the way the community comes together to recognize and affirm the way God is working in the lives of the Church's caretakers.

The liturgy for the Ordination of a Priest can be found beginning on page 524 of your <u>Prayer Book</u>; taken together with the services of ordination for bishops and deacons, this section is known as "the ordinal." The fact that every cleric in the Episcopal Church is ordained with these liturgies points to the common ground that we share together, all ordained with the same words and actions. The service is similar to baptism and confirmation in that it is a rite that takes place in the context of the Eucharist, with some distinct differences. At an ordination, this happens in two places: before the readings of the day and after the sermon and Nicene Creed.

At the beginning of the service, the candidates for ordination are presented to the bishop by representatives of the diocese and the communities that care for the ordinand, certifying that they have met all the formal requirements. The bishop then asks the ordinands to confirm that they will abide by teaching and canon law of the Church, including the directions of the <u>Book of Common Prayer</u>, and the congregation (on behalf of the entire Church!) indicates their willingness to support the newly ordained. Think of it kind of like the declaration of intent at a wedding. Then the real work begins with the Litany for Ordinations (page 548), as the congregation begins to bathe the occasion in prayer for the Church's mission, the needs of the world, and the ordinands themselves.

The service continues, and after the sermon and Creed the ordinands come before the bishop again, this time on their own. The bishop delivers a charge to the ordinands, describing the work that is ahead of them and again asking if they are prepared to take on the responsibilities of ordination, before the ordinands take their formal vows (the analogy to marriage works here too!). After this the ordination proper begins. Following ancient Jewish practice, Christians have always set people aside for new ministry with intercessory prayer and the laying on of hands (see Chapters 6 and 13 of the book of Acts). This pattern has continued unbroken ever since, and this part of the liturgy begins with a hymn to the Holy Spirit (#405 in your Hymnal) that Christians have been singing for 1200 years. After calling on the Spirit, the bishop leads the congregation in a prolonged time of silent prayer, in a posture of listening and waiting that ought to characterize all our prayer. Then the Bishop on behalf of the congregation begins the prayer of consecration, including the climatic moment when the Bishop lays their hands on the head of the ordinands to invoke the power of the Holy Spirit on them. The other priests who are present join in this action to symbolize the induction of a new priest into the council of priests of the diocese. After this the new priest, who until now has been in a simple white robe, receives the vestments of a priest and a Bible from the bishop. For their first actions as priests, the newly ordained assist the Bishop in the celebration of the Eucharist and offer their blessing over the congregation at the end of the service.

In all of this, the laypeople who are present (both physically and virtually) actively participate on behalf of all Christians everywhere in affirming God's call on the lives of those being ordained and by joining their prayers together that the Spirit's movement in the lives of the new priests will be effective. The Methodist pastor Thomas Oden wrote about ordination: "Once the imposition of hands has occurred with sincere prayer of the church... the ordinand has good reason to rely upon that intercession, to credit it, to be reassured by its authenticity, and to recollect happily that his or her work is commissioned, not just by oneself through private inspiration, but rather by the whole historical church in the expectation of fruitful outcome." Your prayers are what makes this work! I ask for your prayers on the day of the ordination and in the many days to come, as we work together to build up God's realm here in Clemson and beyond.

EVENSONG: FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION

ASH WEDNESDAY



We will have an in-person service at Trinity Place at **12:30 pm on Wednesday, February 17**. Rather than the usual Imposition of Ashes by the priests, we will arrange for each congregant to pick up a small container of ashes as they arrive. At the appointed time, we will all impose ashes on ourselves, or household groups may imposes ashes on each other. The Liturgy will otherwise proceed as normal. Masks are required for participation.

We will also make arrangements for each household to participate in the Liturgy for Ash Wednesday in their own homes. We will send a small packet of ashes with instructions and an Order of Worship that can be used in a couple of ways. You can say the prayers and impose ashes as a family when it is convenient for you. You can join a Zoom service at **5:00 pm** (the Zoom link will be provided in a special email that day). Or you may join Canterbury's live-streamed liturgy at **7:00 pm**. Each of these ways to participate in the Liturgy include the invitation to observe a holy Lent—all are invited!

RITE ONE FOR 5 SUNDAYS IN LENT

Our Sunday worship will use Rite One for the Season of Lent. Some of you have expressed a desire to worship using the traditional language of Rite One, which is shared by the clergy of the parish. Therefore, for the five Sundays in Lent, we will worship using those lovely old words.

LENTEN DEVOTIONS



We are pre-recording The Great Litany and Stations of the Cross, which will feature a variety of familiar faces and voices. These recordings will be available on our website for your devotional use as part of your Lenten observance.

You may wish to pray The Great Litany one or more times each week. You might set a time each Friday for Stations of the Cross. You choose the time and frequency for your devotions. We pray that these offerings will help you to observe a holy Lent.



LENT IN A BAG



The Family Ministry Team and Pastoral Care Teams are joining forces to provide "Lent in a Bag" for parishioners the weekend before Ash Wednesday. Families with children and youth will receive a home delivery of a bag full of Lenten practices and activities. Parishioners who received a Christmas goodie bag from the Pastoral Care team will also receive a home delivery of Lent in a Bag.

We will provide Lent in a Bag for pick up at the 2:00 pm service on Sunday, 2/14, and at the 12:30 Ash Wednesday service on 2/17. We will also have a number of the bags

available in the Chapel for pickup beginning 2/14. You may also call Sheryl in the church office to arrange for pick up or delivery if you haven't received one by Ash Wednesday. Our goal is to support each household in observing a holy Lent.




A Special Presentation



In February, Mtr. Suz will offer a 2-part presentation resulting from her research project, completed this fall, looking into more obscure aspects of the history of St. Paul's. The presentation is titled, "Making Room for Every Body: The Stories We Tell About St. Paul's."

The focus is on the presence of enslaved persons as members of the Body of Christ at St. Paul's in the ante-bellum period, with an emphasis on how the slaves came to be part of the "cure of souls" to whom the first three rectors ministered.

Both sessions will last about an hour, with some presentation of historical data and narrative, with time for reflections and questions. The presentation will take place via Zoom on February 7 and 14 at 4:00 pm. Zoom links will be provided in *HT Notes* and the Sunday morning email each week.



Adult Formation in January/February


TAX FREE MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION TRANSFER

As we begin the new year and you contemplate your charitable giving, keep in mind that if you are taking distributions from an IRA or 401K plan, you can donate part (or all) of your distribution to a qualified charitable organization, such as Holy Trinity, on a tax-free basis. Importantly, you do not need to itemize your taxes to take advantage of this benefit. If you are taking distributions but haven't made a Qualified Charitable Distribution before, consult with your tax advisor or financial institution to find out how to do so. Many institutions allow you to do this easily online.



ANNUAL MEETING

After an opening prayer by Fr. Noah and the approval of the minutes of last year's annual meeting, Mtr. Suz thanked the retiring members of the Vestry: Bob Green, Cary Kaye, Sarah Maiberger, and Joe Yanes. Also recognized were Bill Hurst, outgoing Jr. Warden and Bob Taylor, outgoing Treasurer.

Next was the validation of election results and commissioning of new Vestry members: Jan Cribb, Harry Morse, Doris von Kaenel, and Marge Edie. Also now serving on the Vestry in the two positions vacated by Clem Watson and Shannon Quattlebaum (who are serving in other positions) are Peter Sparks and Beth Kunkle. Clem Watson, the new Junior Warden, and Jack McKenna, our new treasurer were also commissioned.

Bill Hurst showed some photos of Holy Trinity from past years when giving the 2020 Junior Warden's report.

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Bob Taylor gave the Treasurer's report and was thanked for his 3 years of service. Then, Jack McKenna, Holy Trinity's new treasurer, gave the 2021 Statement of Mission. Questions should be directed to Jack at **clemson@me.com** or 320-761-0654 (M). Jack began with this tribute:

"Let me begin by thanking Bob Taylor for his leadership as Treasurer for the past 3 years. Without his leadership and encouragement, I would not have accepted the nomination for the position of Treasurer of Holy Trinity. I am confident that with his continued support and that of the Finance Committee Members, Holy Trinity will emerge from the coronavirus pandemic stronger than before."

Jack summarized the Statement of Mission for 2021 with the following:

The meeting was adjourned at 12:35 pm.







CHURCH OFFICE OPERATIONS

Dear Ones,

It has been a while since I've written a mid-week letter to you all. It is on behalf of the office staff that I am writing to you now. The stark fact is that the spread of the virus in the Upstate has increased rapidly through November and into December, with no sign of slowing down. At the same time, the number of visitors to the church office has increased significantly over the course of the fall. Two of our staff members are caregivers for medically fragile family members. I am asking you all to refrain from coming to the church office to conduct business unless it is absolutely necessary until the transmission rates improve significantly. Most business can be conducted by phone or by email. If you need to drop off or pick up items from church, please call ahead to make arrangements for a no-contact or low-contact exchange.

Once the community "opened up" to some degree, and the virus still seemed far off, the sense of urgency eased up a bit. Then the life of the parish picked back up to some degree. Your church staff returned to the church office, although we've maintained strict adherence to masking and distancing requirements. Most of our interactions with each other occur by phone or by Zoom, even though we are just down the hall from one another. We recently cancelled our plans for a distanced Christmas lunch because of our concerns for each other.

We love you all, and we miss you very much. Not a day goes by that we don't mourn the loss of our face-to-face contact with you. All of us in the church office, as well as the Wardens, Vestry, and ministry leaders, continue to monitor the situation and make adjustments, as necessary. Our primary concern is to keep each of us safe, to the best of our ability. Our secondary concern is to maintain our connection with each of you. We will continue to seek creative and life-giving ways to do both.

It is of utmost importance that we protect one another for a while longer. Hope is on the horizon, and we will get through this awful pandemic. I believe that it will be several more months before we can claim a return to some sense of normalcy. Please, *please* follow the recommendations of health-care professionals and scientists for a while longer: stay home as much as possible, maintain at least 6 feet of distance between yourself and others who are not part of your household, wear a mask, and wash your hands often. Take care, and stay well.
