#### KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

#### Beloved in Christ,

I want to share with you a personal story. When I was eight years old, an event occurred that would change the trajectory of my family's life. You see, I was raised by social justice activists. That isn't how my parents would have described themselves, but that is who they were. Both of my parents taught in historically Black schools in Chattanooga, which is where I grew up. My mother was the first full-time White faculty member of Howard High School, which is visible from the interstate that winds through downtown Chattanooga. My parents' Black coworkers and students were frequent guests in our home—which was a moving target because our leases were not renewed. I would venture to guess that my childhood was not typical for a White girl growing up in the South in the latter part of the mid-Twentieth Century.

The event that changed the trajectory of my life occurred one Sunday—I don't remember the season. To be honest, I barely remember that particular day. I do remember being squeezed into the back pew at St. Peter's with my parents, my sisters, and our guests for the day—a Black coworker of my mother's and his family. I don't know if my mother was making a statement by inviting the Edie family, or if it was purely an impulse toward evangelism. I do know that the fallout from that day included my parents' decision not to return to that Episcopal church where I had learned the Lord's Prayer by heart and had heard the story of Moses tucked into a basket and set upon the waters of the Nile to be discovered by Pharoah's daughter. We did not attend any church for the rest of my growing up years, and I did not set foot in a church, except for weddings and funerals, for the next 30 years.

I feel the wounds of institutional racism in my bones and feel called to work to overthrow the systems that perpetuate it. Of course, I am White, and I have not experienced the effects of racism to anywhere near the extent that our Black, Indigenous, Hispanic, and Asian neighbors have. I never will. By upbringing and by vocation, I am compelled to speak out in opposition and to work actively to dismantle systems of oppression. I find that my daily engagement with Scripture and prayer leads me ever more deeply into this conviction. I have also found companions along this path of commitment, companions within and beyond this parish.

A handful of Holy Trinity parishioners have joined Fr. Noah and me in exploring the ways in which we might work together to become the Beloved Community that not only welcomes all, but actively supports and works for equity and justice for all. We have finished our work with the Becoming Beloved Community curriculum, but there is more work to be done. I hope that more of us will join that work. While I don't foresee that there will be Black Lives Matter banners on our front lawn, I would like to work towards a marker at St. Paul's that acknowledges the debt we owe to those whose unpaid, forced labor created the wealth that made the founding of our mother church possible. *The Tempo* is a publication of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church 193 Old Greenville Highway Clemson, SC 29631-1335 Phone: 864-654-5071 Fax: 864-654-5066 <u>www.holytrinityclemson.org</u>

We will continue laying the formational foundation and inviting others to join in discerning a vision for the holy work of dismantling racism. Two specific formational opportunities are available for anyone who is interested: workshops regularly offered by Clemson Area Pledge to End Racism and *Sacred Ground*, which will be offered by the Diocese in the fall. "*Sacred Ground* is part of Becoming Beloved Community, The Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in our personal lives, our ministries, and our society." The Episcopal Church has made a commitment to working for racial justice, reconciliation, and healing. This work calls us into a place of vulnerability. It takes courage, grace, and forbearance. I ask for your willingness to enter a conversation if you feel uncomfortable or troubled by this work. I keep listening deeply—to the words of Scripture, to the small, still voice that comes to me in prayer, and to the wisdom of those among whom God has placed me. Please speak to me if you are troubled by anything I say or do as your Rector. After all, that is the only way in which I can listen and learn from you. If you are interested in joining these efforts, please let me know. I'd love to hear your stories, your convictions, your ideas for becoming Beloved Community in spirit and in truth.

#### FROM FR. NOAH, ASSISTANT TO THE RECTOR

#### WHY DO WE DO THAT? ROGATION DAYS

Ask anyone who knows me and they will tell you I am a city slicker through and through. I grew up in large towns and small cities, and before going to seminary spent most of my adult life in large cityscapes of concrete and glass. Even though my parents made plenty of efforts to expose my sister and me to the great outdoors through camping trips and the occasional foray into vegetable gardening, these weren't activities where I found a lot of joy. But in more recent years, now older and perhaps wiser, I've been trying to do a better job of rounding out my connections to the natural world. I've been hitting the hiking trails more often, and I am happy to report that since moving to Clemson I have successfully managed to keep a number of houseplants alive. The abundant green space we have at Holy Trinity has been a boon too. A few weeks ago I came to the church on a Saturday morning to help out in the SAME Garden at Trinity Place, and planted some squash and cucumber seeds and transplanted an artichoke, and marveled at the abundant wildflowers that are already blooming (the corn cockles, I believe they're called, are my favorite). As I worked with another gardener that day to plant the seeds, we marveled at how little there actually is to worry about when it comes to growing crops, or at least how little is left to our control. We plant the seeds, keep them watered and in the right amount of sun, and God has taught the seeds how to do the rest! Miracle of miracles.

In our modern world most of us have delegated the cultivation of the land to others, and so it is difficult for most of us to pay close attention to the land on which we depend for our survival. Our ancestors knew better; if you didn't grow crops and tend to livestock, you didn't eat, simple as that. Asking God for seasonable weather and a good harvest, for protection from natural disasters, and for a blessing on work were all matters of central importance. Over the years it became traditional to set aside days in the spring for focused prayer during the planting season and to process around the boundaries of the village (known as "beating the bounds" in England), which doubled as an excuse to catch up with neighbors you hadn't seen in a while. These days were known as Rogation Days, from the Latin word *rogare* meaning "to ask" (in Spanish, *rogar* continues to be one of the words used for prayer, especially in the sense of pleading for something in a time of need).

Following ancient custom, the Episcopal Church observes the rogation days in the week leading up to Ascension Day, on May 13 this year. You can find prayers for these days on page 258 of your Prayer Book. This year we will observe Rogation Sunday on May 9 at the 9am service at Trinity Place as we bless the parish gardens and ask for God's blessing on the fruits of the earth here and around our community. This would also be a great time to pray over any plants of your own you have at home, or to invite Mtr. Suz or I to come bless your garden or farm (I have a friend in Arkansas who leads a blessing of the tractors every year!). Perhaps beating the bounds looks like getting your family or some friends together to walk around your neighborhood as you ask for God's protection over your community through the year and check in on some neighbors you haven't seen in a while.

God's first command to humanity at the dawn of history was to care for the earth and its creatures. Even as modern life has drawn us away from a daily awareness of this task, part of our job as Christians is to pay attention to the miracles of the natural order and to recognize God's presence in it. I hope that this Rogationtide you'll take some time to remember your dependence on God's continuing presence in the scattered seed and the tilled soil, and to pray that God will make you a good steward of the portion of the earth entrusted to you.

God who alone provides seed for the sower and bread for the eater, you have taught us to ask of you our daily bread: Bless the sowing of the seed this year, grant fertility to the soil, and strengthen the hands of the gardeners who till it, that through their labor your people may be nourished; through Jesus Christ, the bread of life. Amen.

- 5:00 pm Holy Eucharist at St. Paul's on the first Sunday of each month beginning in June

#### CHORAL EVENSONG FOR THE FEAST OF THE ASCENSION

We have been marking special days on the Church calendar with livestreamed Evensong services. For the Feast of the Ascension on May 13, we are going to take it up a notch, incorporating a choral quartet from our Chancel Choir. The Feast of the Ascension takes place forty days after Easter (always a Thursday).

The Feast itself commemorates when, on the fortieth day after His Resurrection, Jesus led His disciples to the Mount of Olives, and after blessing them and asking them to wait for the fulfillment of the promise of the Holy Spirit, He ascended into heaven. It is a bright feast, an Easter feast, albeit one that begins an "in-between" time in which the disciples no longer had the presence of the Risen Christ in their midst and before they enjoyed the benefits of the gift of the Holy Spirit. Our choral Evensong will be livestreamed on Facebook at **5:00 pm on Thursday, May 13**. Please do join us as we honor this pivotal event in the life of the Church.

#### **BISHOP SEARCH**

Grace to you and peace from the members of the Bishop's Nominating Committee for the Ninth Bishop of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina.

Since our last update, the Nominating Committee has met many times via Zoom and in person, as we entered a careful process of discernment and rigorous evaluation of the candidates for bishop. As mentioned before, this confidential process is based faithfully on the Diocesan Survey and the Profile built around the survey results. A timeline for the process is included in the Profile. Once the nomination and application deadlines had passed, committee members were able to begin reviewing applications. We met in person in March to carefully evaluate each candidate's application. After prayerful discernment, the decision was made to narrow the strong candidate pool in accordance with the deep desires for certain qualities and experiences in our next bishop expressed in the survey and outlined in the profile. Following the March meeting, teams of committee members began interviewing the continuing candidates, checking their references, and reviewing sermons, publications, and social media in preparation for further discernment. We are enjoying getting to know the candidates and explore with them how their gifts fit with the challenges and opportunities cited in the profile. In April, the committee will meet in retreat to further narrow the candidate pool, again using the survey and profile as our guide. In the late spring, an in-person retreat will be scheduled with the remaining candidates. Afterwards, we will enter a time of deep and prayerful listening and consideration in moving toward the recommendation of a slate of candidates to the Standing Committee.

In the process of Christian spiritual discernment, we open our hearts and listen for God's guidance through the Holy Spirit. We, as a committee, are bound to this process of faithful listening, along with ongoing individual and group prayer. We pray for all applicants and their families, for the process, for our diocese, and for the election that will bring us our new Chief Pastor and Bishop. We ask that you join us in these prayers and pray for us and our work as well.


#### **DISCOVERY CLASS**

#### CLEMSON AREA PLEDGE TO END RACISM LIVING THE PLEDGE WORKSHOP



In order to make the Clemson Area Pledge to End Racism something that becomes an integral part of our daily lives, we offer a workshop to reflect, learn, and practice how to develop and maintain this commitment. This workshop is for people who have signed the Pledge and for those who are considering signing it. Our hope is to build a strong, multi-faith foundation for continued collaborative anti-racism work in the Clemson area. We plan to continue offering this workshop and to provide additional opportunities for learning and growth related to racism and oppression in the future.

**Save the Date:** This complete workshop will take place over two sessions on Saturday, **May 8** and Saturday, **May 22** from 9am – 4pm. Each session will include a lunch break and two additional 15 minute breaks.

**Suggested Contribution:** In order to support the ongoing work associated with CAPER programming, a \$30 per person contribution is suggested. Please consider how your ability to contribute may support participation by someone who cannot make a contribution. Thank you.

#### Goals:

The primary goal of this workshop is to develop confidence in our abilities to:

- Integrate the Pledge into our daily lives
- Confront racism and bias in our everyday lives
- Recognize and challenge systemic racism
- Take leadership in ending racism in our community, our culture, and our lives

As part of the workshop, participants develop a community of support and an understanding of how to use that support to deepen our work in building a just and equitable world.

#### Who Should Participate in a Living the Pledge Workshop?

If you have never taken a class about racism, this workshop will challenge you to invest in and deepen your learning so you can put yourself on the road to intercultural competence. For people who have engaged in other anti-racism/multiculturalism training, this workshop is designed to take your understanding and your competency to a deeper level.

#### Participation

Participants are asked to commit to being present at all sessions (approximately 12 hours of large and small group work) and to complete a manageable amount of reading/viewing assignments in advance of each session. After you register, you'll receive an email with information about pre-workshop resources. The Living the Pledge workshops are led by trained leaders and small group facilitators.






#### **CLEMSON COMMUNITY CARE**

The homeless shelter in Seneca has branched out and now not only helps the homeless but works with individuals who are at risk of becoming homeless. For those who meet criteria, Our Daily Rest helps with utilities and rent and connects individuals with social services to help avoid the outcome of homelessness. Our Daily Rest also partners with landlords to identify safe and affordable housing. Another new program partners with local contractors to help repair and replace major home features, like roofing. Always your generosity, help and prayers are needed and appreciated.

The shelter still needs daily use items (*e.g.* coffee, sugar, trash bags, laundry detergent, cleaning supplies, gift cards). For now they have ample clothing. As we strive each day to be Christ's servants, may we be mindful of the time and talents gifted to us and how to share them with our brothers and sisters.



#### MAKE A DIFFERENCE

In April of 2018, Holy Trinity committed to supporting thirteen talented young students from the village of Cange to complete their university studies. As of this month, SEVEN have graduated! The six who are left, Jacob, Ronald, Moleine, Junie, Putherson, and Ebert, can see the end in sight. Most of them have only ONE YEAR left before graduation. Now comes the hard part. We need your help to keep our scholarship fund going. Once the funds that are there are gone, we will become unable to complete our commitment to support these students. They will have to quit and go home without finishing their degrees. We cannot let this happen.

You are all aware of the close ties the Episcopal Diocese of Upper South Carolina (EDUSC) has with Haiti, and in particular, the villages of Cange and Bois Joli. Many parishioners from Holy Trinity have visited or been actively involved with that connection. All of our students are native to this region and graduates of our supported secondary schools. The beauty of EDUSC's approach to this mission is that it focuses on developing the innate capabilities of the Haitian people, themselves, to improve their own communities and, in the process, their lives.

The Vestry generously designates a portion of the annual budget for Outreach. This year, the Outreach Committee, in turn, has designated a significant portion of their budget to support our Haitian Student Scholarship Program, until our students complete their studies. However, it is not enough to take us to graduation. We need your help. *Jacob, Ronald, Moleine, Junie, Putherson, and Ebert need your help!* 

You can make a difference. The cost per student for one year at university, which includes tuition, books, fees, supplies, and room and board, is a bargain at \$5000, but for these students, that amount of money is an impossible obstacle. Would you consider sponsoring all or part of a scholarship? Or, make it a group project to raise funds for one scholarship? Anything you can do would make a world of difference for these kids.

We are now seeing the fruits of this effort as these young adults complete a university education and return to their community to educate, train, assist and tend to the next generation. These scholarships give them that chance. One of the first scholarship students from Cange graduated with a medical degree and returned to the medical clinic in Cange as a doctor. He is giving back to his community. This is just the first success story.

Holy Trinity does not send scholarship funds directly to individual students in Haiti. Funds are administered for our students through Summits Education, a 501c3 based in Boston, whose mission is to build education systems in rural Haiti. Summits believes access to a quality education is a human right and has agreed to help us complete our commitment to these students.

We are a university parish, supporting university students. Imagine how important this generation of collegeeducated youth will be in developing Haiti as a country.



#### CANGE CRUCIFIX



#### HISTORY OF THE LAFONTANT CRUCIFIX

The original Lafontant Crucifix was designed by Father Fritz Lafontant in the late 1960's when he was a young priest sent by his diocese to minister to a largely impoverished rural population in the Central Plateau of Haiti. His tireless dedication to the rural poor in this region over the next 60+ years led to a nearly 40-year partnership with the Episcopal Diocese of Upper South Carolina and ultimately the creation of Boston based Partners in Health and the Socio-Medico-Educational complex in Cange. At each of his missions over the years, a hand wrought iron stylized crucifix of his design marked each mission as a joint project of these partners. His daughter Marie Flore remembers the early years as follows:

"As I can remember, very small, my Father was drawing a crucifix whenever he had a piece of paper in hand. I believe it was around the 70's that he started working with a first iron man but deduced that it was not what he was looking for. He then tried a second ironman but was still not satisfied. He later found a young ironman called Ti Michel who worked with him for months before he concluded that it was the final model."

The stylized wrought iron crucifix hanging at the rear of our sanctuary was commissioned in Haiti and hand wrought in Cange in 2015 by this same, now older Ti Michel. Thanks be to God.

#### **COMPOST & RECYCLING PROGRAM**

Holy Trinity has partnered with Compost House, an Atlas Organics company. They provide specialized containers to collect waste appropriate for making compost and pick up the waste on a two week schedule. In addition to reducing landfill waste through this program, Holy Trinity receives compost from Compost House that is used in our SAME Garden. Pre-pandemic, we were diverting about 20 gallons of compostable materials from the landfill each week. Appropriate items for composting include:

- Fruit/Veggie Scraps
- Dairy, Eggs & Shells
- Pastas, Bread, and Grains
- Unwanted Leftovers
- Cooked Meat, Fish & Bones
- Cooked Seafood and Shells
- Coffee Grounds & Filters
- Paper Egg Cartons
- Paper Towels
- Paper Napkins
- Pizza Boxes
- BPI Certified Products

To support the program, please be on the lookout for the following labels on waste cans. Any of the listed items above should be placed in these special marked containers.

Please also note the waste items on these labels that should **not** be placed in the container.

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The compostable waste should be placed in the following specialty containers. As shown in the following image, they are square, white colored containers with lids about the same size as a typical 5 gallon bucket. They will have the blue Compost House decal and a green bag inside.



Once one of these containers is full, they should be placed on the back steps leading to the Day School playground. Fresh containers can be picked up in the table storage room across from the kitchen.

In the restrooms at Holy Trinity you will find waste baskets with the Compost House logo for paper towels to be placed in. These containers will be emptied on a periodic basis by the Sexton and placed in appropriate containers for collection by Compost House. Please remember only paper towels go in these, all other trash goes in the regular trash can.

Other recyclable items such as print and copy paper, paperboard boxes, aluminum and steel cans, and plastics numbers 1 and 2 are collected in the traditional blue containers pictured below.



The recycle items are collected on periodic basis by the Sexton and placed in appropriate containers (without bags) for the City of Clemson to collect as part of their recycling program. Unfortunately, the City does not collect corrugated cardboard or plastics number 3-7. Therefore those items should be placed in normal trash containers. Corrugated cardboard and plastics number 1, 2 and 5 can also be taken to Kite Hill recycling center.
