KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

Dear Ones,


Someone recently asked, “Now that we have Trinity Place, what are we going to do with it?” This is an excellent question, and one for which I have only a partial answer. I invite you to share your dreams and aspirations for our wonderful new space—open space, green space, growing space, welcoming space. How might Holy Trinity use Trinity Place to open our doors and our hearts to our neighbors? How might we use that space to grow in faith? What is God calling us to be or do in providing us with this wonderful space?

Last year, dreaming about the potential uses of Trinity Place overlapped with the realities of COVID as we watched the sometimes painfully slow transformation of “the lot next door” into an extension of Holy Trinity, an integrated part of our physical presence in the community. Little did we know when we began that work in January of 2020 that Trinity Place would become our primary worship space for many months. The congregation that gathered there comprised members of the traditional 8:00 service and the 10:30 service, with Clemson students claiming their circles in the grass during the fall and spring semesters. It is most fitting that the first use of Trinity Place was to provide a home for the celebration of Holy Eucharist week after week after week. That space has been hallowed in a way that I, for one, had never imagined.



The SAME Garden, now registered with the Good News Garden movement of the Episcopal Church, includes 16 raised beds, several fruit trees and scuppernong vines, as well as herb beds and a good number of blueberry bushes outside the fence. (See Beth Kunkel's article about the Good News Garden movement on page 5.) Beth, along with a cadre of faithful volunteers, works each week to plan, plant, tend, and harvest So All May Eat. This ongoing ministry offers opportunity for hands-on work to feed our neighbors, as well as providing a safe space for gathering together with a common purpose. This summer, I'll be working on a set of self-directed prayer stations around all of the garden spaces at Holy Trinity, beginning and ending at the SAME Garden at Trinity Place.

Trinity Place is also a space that welcomes young people to the grounds of Holy Trinity, inviting them to gather and offering freedom of movement. Canterbury gathered in the pavilion for much of the 2020-2021 school year, sharing meals prepared by parishioners and growing in faith together under Fr. Noah's guidance. Our Episcopal Day School students learned about stewardship of God's creation by tending to their boxes in the SAME Garden, and they ran and played and splashed through sprinklers on the lawn. Youth from churches around the Clemson area are gathering each Wednesday for fun, fellowship, and faith development, thanks to the organizational work of Bill Purkerson. Plans are underway for an event to welcome Clemson students back to school—watch for more details from Fr. Noah in the next edition of *Tempo*.

CHANGE IS IN THE AIR

Holy Trinity communications are being streamlined. We will now have three ways to share information with parishioners: *HT Notes*, a *Sunday Bulletin* insert sheet of announcements, and *Tempo*. (There will be some overlap, but not as much as there was prior to the new streamlined communications.)

Weekly email: *HT Notes*

- Looking ahead 10-14 days, this publication will cover specifically what you need to know in the coming week and perhaps the week after that one.
- This will be distributed only by email.

Weekly *Sunday Bulletin* announcement sheet:

- This sheet will be an insert to the *Sunday Bulletin* and will contain what you should be on the lookout for in that day's worship service and
- Looking up to 4 weeks ahead, a lot of *HT Notes* will also go in here.

Monthly (or possibly every two months) newsletter: *Tempo*

- This will contain what is happening now or in the recent past along with updates from ministry leaders, parish news, and photos of parish events.
- A detailed calendar will be on the back page of *Tempo* that you can tear off the printed version or print only that page for you use.
- Looking up to 6-8 weeks ahead, this publication will be posted on the website and emailed to every parishioner.




FROM FR. NOAH, ASSISTANT TO THE RECTOR**PRACTICES FOR THE JOURNEY**

Every year as the late spring begins to turn to summer, we leave behind Eastertide and embark on the long green and growing season after Pentecost. In some churches this season is known as “ordinary time,” originally referring to the ordinal numbers that mark the many Sundays between Pentecost and Advent, but it also has acquired the double meaning of the ordinariness of living the Christian life. There is no particular aspect of the mystery of Christ that we ponder in this season, only the unremarkable ebb and flow of time as we “work out our salvation” (Philippians 2). The highs and lows of the cycle of feasting and fasting that we enjoy between Advent Sunday and Pentecost are intriguing and important, to be sure, but so is simple fidelity to walking the long path of discipleship. As we walk with Jesus and the disciples through the Gospel of Mark this summer and fall, we will be drawn in by how exciting and fast-paced their lives must have been, but let us not forget all the ordinary moments that the evangelists didn’t write about. Following Jesus is boring and tedious sometimes, and that’s part of the deal too.

As we set out on the path of this season, perhaps it is a good time to check in with our souls and see what we may need for the journey. What parts of your life feel in sync with God and are producing the fruits of the Spirit? Where are the areas of your life that feel barren, where the soil needs to be tilled and watered? Where are you being intentional about letting God in and where do you need to re-examine your priorities? Borrowing from ancient monastic wisdom, many Christians find it helpful to consider developing a *rule of life*, either as an ongoing set of practices or as an exercise to help take stock of one’s spiritual life. Despite its name, such a rule is not meant to be a rigid set of commandments, but a helpful diagnostic and method of accountability to oneself. Let it be a blend of things you are already doing and of realistic goals, and if you are trying something new that just doesn’t seem to be taking after a few weeks of trying, it’s okay to make an adjustment.

The classic Anglican/Episcopal framework would include regular reception of the Eucharist (and a regular examination of your conscience in preparation), the daily offices of Morning and Evening Prayer (one or more of the daily devotions on page 136 of your Prayer Book are an excellent place to look if you’re just starting out), and time set aside for personal prayer. If you want to take a broader look at your life, there are many excellent guides available. The brothers of the Society of St. John the Evangelist offer *Living Intentionally*, a free workbook for crafting a rule of life that you can find on their website (ssje.org/category/rule-of-life), which offers questions and suggestions orbiting around your relationship with God and the Church, with others, with yourself, and with your resources. The Society of St. Mary Magdalene, an ecumenical fellowship of mainline Christians, asks its members to identify one or two focuses each in the areas of common prayer and worship, private spiritual exercises, study, mutual support and accountability, evangelism, love of neighbor, generosity, and temperance (for a deeper dive, visit ssmarymagdalene.org/rule).

If you’re interested in learning more about adopting a rule of life as a practice, have questions, or just aren’t quite sure how to start, please get in touch! I pray that this long green and growing season is one that bears much fruit for you.

WORSHIP GUIDELINES

We have received new guidance from Bishop Waldo regarding indoor worship and gatherings. These guidelines began **Sunday, June 13, 2021** for all Holy Trinity services.

1. Vaccinated persons may worship indoors without a mask
 2. Masks are required for indoor worship for unvaccinated persons
 3. Only vaccinated persons may sing indoors, whether in choir or congregation
 4. Unvaccinated persons are to maintain 3' social distancing
- Masks are not just for the unvaccinated! You may have your own reasons for wearing a mask, and as a Christian community bound together by love, we will respect that without judgment.
 - We will continue to supply hand sanitizer and encourage everyone to use it as they enter the Narthex
 - We ask that if you or someone in your household feels unwell, please stay home and take care of yourselves. If you feel really unwell, please let us know so that we can help take care of you!
 - We will not require proof of vaccination, but I do continue to encourage those who are able to get the vaccine to do so as soon as possible.
 - We recognize that there are still members of our parish, especially those under the age of 12, who cannot be vaccinated yet. I am especially hoping to hear from parents your thoughts on best practices with your young children for worship and Sunday School as we prepare for school year.
 - We look forward to resuming our 8:00 am service under these new guidelines on July 11.
 - We will continue to livestream our 10:30 am service for those who are unable to join us in person

GOOD NEWS GARDENS

As the pandemic began and there was little opportunity for gatherings-especially indoors-a fledgling agrarian movement within the church began to gain traction. In April of 2020, the Evangelism and Creation Care teams at the national church launched the Good News Gardens program and an Agrarian Ministry Facebook page. As of mid-February of 2021, there are over 240 Good News Gardens and over 1200 people on the Facebook page, including the SAME garden and my small home garden. Some gardens are quite large (measured in acres) but most are small like ours. Some are pots of herbs on a patio.



What does it mean to be a Good News Garden? We are asked to “plant” more, pray more and proclaim more. I put plant in quotations because there are honeybee, chicken, and other animal ministries as well as cooking ministries happening as part of the Good News Gardens program. It does not have to be much at all. Last year, I shared more of my home garden produce with neighbors and left flower and herb bundles for the mail carrier.

There are also monthly “zoom” calls and a newsletter for the network. We learned much more—the history of “Victory gardens” (that date back to before World War I), ideas for Rogation Days, efforts to address food insecurity.

When we were able to install the SAME garden last fall, we began a year of growing mostly foods that have a connection to our past in this place; that focus continues this summer and perhaps this fall. We have been asked to share the stories of some of those foods with the network at large. Most of our produce has been donated to CCC (some 55 pounds thus far) and also shared an “Easter Bunny Salad” with parishioners who got a pastoral care bag on Easter weekend.

It is very inspiring to be a part of this group and see the many ways this simple concept is impacting lives around the country. I would love to share stories. And, if you have a home garden or pots of herbs, sign up as a Good News Garden!

Here's what you need to know about our church parking:

1. All church members need to obtain and display an Episcopal shield sticker (available at the office) on their bumper or back window. Towing will be enforced.
2. Frontage road will become University parking beginning July 1, 2021 with these exceptions:
 - 3 marked/signed spaces, for our use, will be reserved in front of Holy Trinity's office entrance.
 - The University will allow parking on Sundays for church functions and other special occasions.
3. The parking lot in the rear of the church will be open for business as usual provided you have a sticker. (Note that there are 5 spaces marked for Seniors. Any member requiring special conditions such as handicapped van accessibility should contact the church office.)
4. The new parking lot near Trinity Place will be a mix of leased spaces and specific Holy Trinity parking. Holy Trinity will have use of 9 spaces that are numbered 52-60. Remember that you need to have a church sticker!




