KEEPING THE FAITH: SUZ'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

My Dear Friends in Christ,

I hardly know how to begin my letter this month. Our hopes were to rally together to celebrate our faith and enjoy our fellowship. The delta variant of COVID-19, with its rapid spread, has made it clear that we need to re-think our plans. We are returning to our earlier limits on indoor gatherings other than worship until our community consisting of Pickens, Oconee, and Anderson counties—returns to more acceptable levels of risk for spread of the virus. For that determination, we are following the CDC risk level assessment map and are looking for all three counties to return to "moderate" risk.

Until then, we ask everyone to wear a mask when you enter our buildings. Worship in the Nave continues at 8:00 am and 10:30 am. So far there has been plenty of room to spread out. Beginning September 12, we will offer a simple Holy Eucharist with no music on Trinity Place at 9:30 am for those who are not comfortable worshiping indoors at this time. Meetings or gatherings of more than 12 people should be held outdoors or online. If you choose to meet online and need help setting that up, contact Sheryl in the church office, and she will be happy to help you with that. Please remember to wash or sanitize your hands often. Hand sanitizer dispensers are located near the most frequently used entrances at Holy Trinity for your convenience. If you feel unwell, please stay home and take care of yourself!

In some ways, this reprise of pandemic mode is harder than it was the first time around. Almost all of us reveled in that sense of freedom that came with getting vaccinated and watching the world open up around us. However, there is one group who have never quite felt that relief—parents whose children can't be vaccinated. Parents, I want you to know that not a day goes by without fervent prayers offered for your families' protection. I pray for you every morning with my first cup of coffee, and we pray for you every night during our intercessions at Compline. You are not alone. We are all in this together, and your Holy Trinity family is here to support you. Our new Family Minister, Jerae Wallace, is looking forward to working with your families to provide encouragement and resources for spiritual refreshment.

This is hard. This time of resurgent pandemic is frustrating and fraught with anxiety. In times like these, we need moments of respite from the mental and emotional turmoil. I urge each of you to set limits on the amount of time that you spend engaged with the never-ending flow of information (or misinformation) and discourse. It will be there when you pick it back up! Set intentional time for prayer, breathe deeply, and take care of your body. These practices won't make the pandemic go away, but they can help you find your balance for the journey through it.

I lift up my eyes to the hills, from where is my help to come? My help is the in Name of the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth. (Psalm 121:1-2)

The walkabout on Saturday, September 11, at Christ Church Episcopal School will be livestreamed for those who wish to hear more from the candidates.

The electing convention will be held September 25 at Trinity Cathedral in Columbia. Please keep our clergy and lay delegates in your prayers as they consider who the Holy Spirit is calling to be our next bishop. Our diocesan representatives to the convention are: Kirby Colson, Beth Kunkel, Kevin Hughes and Eric Naeseth. Fr. Noah and Mtr. Suz will also attend and vote.

A refreshed group of faces

As I write this we are already well on our way to our third Canterbury meeting of the year and the fall semester is in full swing! As students returned and the class of 2025 arrived on campus, we had a wonderful time getting to meet many members of this year's freshman and sophomore classes at Tiger Prowl, the annual student activities fair at Death Valley. Outfitted with new flyers, new stickers, a digital sign-up form, and welcoming faces, we spread the good news of an open-minded Christian group right here on campus where everyone is invited to encounter Christ, make new friends, and serve those in need. Between contacts made during Welcome Week, referrals from clergy and youth workers throughout the state, and returning members from

- Growth learning more about what following Jesus has to do with living in the real world



WORSHIP GUIDELINES

Effective now we are observing the following safety practices for indoor gatherings, following the latest guidance from the CDC and the direction of Bishop Waldo:

- All individuals over the age of 2 must mask while indoors, regardless of vaccination status.
- Unvaccinated individuals are additionally required to maintain 3 feet of distance from the next household and are not permitted to sing in full voice.

In recent weeks, Lincoln Pipe Organ has been wrapping up installation of pipes and tuning. There are still a few finishing touches, but the work is almost complete!

SEASON OF CREATION

Each year, from September 1 to October 4, churches around the world celebrate the Season of Creation. September 1 is the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation and October 4 is the Feast Day for St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint for ecology. It also coincides with harvest time in many places.

The Episcopal Church is a participant in this international effort for prayer and action for climate justice and an end to environmental racism and ecological destruction. This year's theme is *A home for all?* Renewing the Oikos of God. In celebrating the season, we are invited to consider anew our ecological, economic, and political ways of living.

I had to look up the meaning of "oikos" and learned that it is a basic unit of society in Greek city-states. It can refer to



the family, the family's property and the actual dwelling. In a broader context, it can refer to all God's creatures and the earth where we all dwell.

The logo for this Season of Creation is Abraham's Tent. It reminds us of the radical hospitality Abraham showed the three strangers who came upon his tent. As we know, they were angels of God and this hospitality became great blessings. We are also reminded of how everything and every being on the earth are interwoven and are gifts from God. The open tent also represents a place for discernment and dialogue and a refuge for all creatures.

This season we are invited to pray for our common earth, engage in activities that help creation thrive, and advocate for climate justice. Both the Episcopal Church Creation Care website (www.episcopalchurch.org/ministries/creation-care/resources/) and the Season of Creation website (seasonofcreation.org) have excellent ideas and actions for intentionally observing this season.

Holy Trinity will join this global celebration of the "web of life," by incorporating the Oikos theme into our prayer life, our worship, our formation offerings, and our fellowship times. We will provide resources to enrich parishioners' prayers, focus on Oikos in preaching and teaching, and invite other congregations in Clemson to join us at Trinity Place for an ecumenical service of prayer and celebration in honor of God's Creation. We will continue our engagement with Creation throughout the program year with a variety of offerings focused on our land: working and praying in the SAME Garden to feed our neighbors, assessing our carbon footprint and discerning ways to decrease it, forming teams of stewards to plan and implement sustainable care for the various components of our land and their use.

The thematic emblem for this year's Season of Creation is "Abraham's Tent," a reference to the radical hospitality that Abraham and Sarah showed to the three angels who visited them. The tent image also echoes the Christian motif of God "tenting" or dwelling with us in the person of Jesus Christ. This theme invites us to consider the responsibilities and privileges of belonging to the household of God. We are called to be stewards, rather than consumers, of the world that God created. *God saw everything he had made: it was supremely good.* God made humanity and gave us memory, reason, and skill for the task of taking care of the world and all that is in it. This Season of Creation offers a time to reflect and reset our intentions for being God's stewards. Come and join us at Abraham's tent.





SUNDAY SUPPER CLUB

Sunday Evenings September-December: bring a bite to eat and learn something about God! This fall, we are moving our Adult Sunday School to suppertime. Each month will focus on a different theme or learning topic. Participants are encouraged to bring a bite to eat while we learn about God. The class will start at 6:00 pm and wrap up by 7:15 pm. Childcare will be available upon request. For the months of September and October, we are planning to meet in the pavilion at Trinity Place. We'll provide more info about November and December meeting space as we get closer to that time.

SEPTEMBER: Good News in the Garden with Beth Kunkel

- 9/12—"Tell Me Some Good News" An introduction to the Good News Garden movement. This first session features a Good News Garden program they did in MI last summer, tying gardening into discipleship and evangelism.
- 9/19—"Soil & Sacrament" with Dr. Fred Bahnson's Tedx of the same name reflecting on how he came to farm ministry, a topic of relevance to us as we continue to imagine the ministry opportunities presented by our own Good News Garden at Holy Trinity
- 9/26—"Food and Faith: A Theology of Eating." Dr. Norman Wirzba invites reflection on respecting the sanctity of life and how that relates to our patterns of food production and consumption.

OCTOBER: How2charist with Mtr. Suz

Explore the meaning and significance of the various components of our primary worship experience, the Holy Eucharist. We will engage with the wonderful How2charist videos created by The Rev. - 10/10—Liturgy of the Word Gathering, processing, reading Scripture, reflecting Scripture, and praying together in preparation for receiving Holy Communion
- 10/17—Liturgy of the Table The offerings of ourselves, the offering of Christ as the bread is taken, blessed, broken, and shared for our spiritual nourishment.

NOVEMBER: Saints Alive with Fr. Noah

We've been commemorating noteworthy Christians at our nightly Compline prayers. Why do we do this? Who gets to be a saint? What do saints have to do with our everyday lives? Join Fr. Noah in November as we talk about what our Episcopal tradition has to teach about this "great cloud of witnesses."

ADVENT: Death, Judgement, Hell, and Heaven--the Joy of Advent

"Advent is not simply a transitional season but in and of itself communicates a message of immense, even ultimate, importance. Of all the seasons of the church year, Advent most closely mirrors the daily lives of Christians and of the church, asks the most important ethical questions, presents the most accurate picture of the human condition, and above all, orients us to the future of the God who will come again."–Fleming Rutledge.
