Going off the Map

Dear Ones,

I think it is no secret that the place of the church in our society has been shifting for some time. The pandemic has only accelerated that shift, and we really have no choice but to recognize that we are now "off the map" of how churches effectively join with God's mission to reconcile all people to God, creation, and each other. The basic tasks of that work have not changed. We worship God in the beauty of holiness, inviting and welcoming people wherever they are in their faith journey. We take care of our siblings in Christ, living his commandment to love one another without any conditions. We take care of the world God created, acknowledging how and where our choices affect the health of this beautiful planet and the people who live on it. We take care of the people who surround us, finding ways to connect their needs to our gifts from God.

What has changed is that many of the tools and the methods that served the church's work for the latter half of the 20th century are no longer effective. We often approach this work with the equivalent of a Rand-McNally Atlas in a GPS world. I'm not suggesting that we give up the atlas, but we will need to find ways to translate it for those who are accustomed to something less tangible. How do we enter into this new territory of transformation and adaptation without losing our essential identity as followers of Jesus in the Episcopal branch of the Way? How do we connect the deep spiritual thirst of the people around us with the deep spring of Living Water offered by the love and grace of Jesus Christ?

Going off the Map (Continued)

Perhaps as we prepare to set out on this new, adaptive path, it would be wise to take stock of our own spiritual backpacks. If we want to be effective messengers of the Good News that we have received, we need to make sure that our backpacks contain sufficient food and water for the journey. Are we a people who pray morning and night? Are we a people who read and study our primary source of wayfinding lore, the Bible? Are we a people who gather in worship to receive the distinctive benefit of offering praise and thanksgiving in the company of other pilgrims on the Way?

Brian McLaren published a book a few years ago that addressed these questions by assuming that we are all at a crossroads. We can choose to "learn, mature, change, and grow," or we can "stagnate, regress, restrict, and lose [our] way." The book is called, We Make the Road by Walking. If we are going to move forward, we will need to walk together. We will need to be alert for the obstacles that we encounter, and we will need to be on the lookout for the signs that we are moving in the right direction. And we begin by connecting with our Guide as we worship together. Everything flows from that central place of Word and Sacrament. Come, let's get ready for the journey ahead. The world is waiting for us to come to it with Good News.

God has blessed Holy Trinity with a hard-working, talented, and dedicated Vestry. They attend monthly Zoom meetings, as well as working on projects to bring people back to church and closer to God. Here is a summary of the Vestry accomplishments in August and September.

The Father's House Continued:

Buildings and Grounds. Part of our work includes taking care of "the Father's House", so all have a welcoming place to gather, worship and hear God's voice. The love and care that goes into maintaining our beautiful church buildings and grounds never fails to touch my heart. It would take pages to share everything, but here are some of the latest projects the Vestry is tackling. John Warner is leading a project to update our hearing assistance devices with a Bluetooth enabled technology. Iris Reed shared information on the need to secure the sacramental vessels used at St. Paul's leading us to approve installation of a floor safe. Mary Lou Sigsby is working with the St. Paul's committee to secure financing for a major renovation project of St. Paul's exterior. Clem Watson is investigating the aging Nave HVAC compressor as the Vestry considers how to fund its replacement.

<u>Mutual Ministry Review</u>. With Diocesan guidance, the Vestry has engaged a Mutual Ministry Review facilitator, Mother Lynn Sanders. Harry Morse and Betty Snowden volunteered to lead the Mutual Ministry Review design with her. This team has started organizing and preparing for our Mutual Ministry Review.

<u>Divine Purpose Statement.</u> The Vestry held our "Divine Purpose Workshop" on **1 August**. After our summer of prayer, the Vestry found we were able to easily develop our Divine Purpose statement. We may have some work to do to live into that statement, but we feel certain God guided us in what we produced.

<u>Church Finance</u>. As of August, our Pledge and Plate Offerings are \$352,785 which is slightly ahead of budget. Our expenses have been higher than budget primarily due to timing of some expenses and higher facilities costs. We expect for these trends to level out by the end of the year. The Finance Committee has started working on the 2023 Statement of Mission Budget for the Vestry to review. Holy Trinity is blessed to has such a superb Finance Committee to support the Vestry in its stewardship of your gifts.

Football Parking Ministry. Our Parking Ministry led by Jenn Ellison, Bill Hurst, Beth Kunkel and many others reported that they are completely filling the parking lot for Clemson football home games. The Parking Ministry provides hospitality and security while managing our parking lot. The Parking Team creates lasting relationships as they represent Holy Trinity in this important mission. <u>Outreach</u> – On October 9, Harry Morse presents information about Holy Trinity's support of Summit Education in Haiti. He is leading a walk in the SC Botanical Gardens on October 15 to raise money for Summit Education. See page 20 for more information.

Who Does What in the Church Office

With new names and faces in our church office, this seems like a good time to let you know how responsibilities are divided up so that you know whom to contact with your questions and requests for service.

Vanessa Apicello, Office Administrator

Vanessa's job is primarily to keep the day-to-day, ongoing work of the church office moving along. This means that she orders supplies, handles requests for information from parishioners and the general public, provides practical support for ministry leaders in the parish, and is the coordinator of parish communications. That means that if you have a question about programs or events, you would contact Vanessa. If you have an item that needs to be communicated to the parish, Vanessa is your gal!



Vanessa keeps the parish calendar up-to-date, so please be sure to contact her if you or your ministry group has a meeting or an event that we need to schedule. Vanessa will work with you to reserve the appropriate space and to ensure that there are no conflicting activities at that time. She can also set up a Zoom meeting for your group if you are meeting online. Please note that Vanessa does not maintain appointment calendars for the clergy or other staff members. You will need to contact them directly to arrange appointments.

Vanessa schedules volunteers, primarily worship leaders and helpers, through Ministry Scheduler Pro. She also maintains training records for volunteers, staff, and ministry leaders, as well as parish membership records. Vanessa creates and prints out our weekly bulletins and makes sure that the online bulletin is posted each week. She also handles a myriad of other tasks that keeps things running smoothly in the church office, including greeting every visitor with a smile. Evyone Washington, Finance Administrator

Evyone Washington's job is to manage all the financial transactions of the parish. She keeps the books in order, pays the bills, tracks donations, and provides regular financial reports to ministry leaders. She works closely with the Treasurer, the Finance Committee, and the Vestry to provide the information they need to keep the parish on sound financial footing. Evyone is also happy to help parishioners with any questions they have about their contributions to Holy Trinity and other



question they may have about financial matters related to the church. Be assured, Evyone takes seriously the responsibility to maintain confidentiality about all such conversations. Evyone also keeps the books and handles financial transactions for the Holy Trinity Episcopal Day School. Jerae Wallace, Family Ministry Coordinator

Jerae Wallace's job is to coordinate ministry with Holy Trinity's families, with a primary focus on families with children in the home. Jerae oversees nursery staff and Sunday School teachers, providing curricular materials and supplies for the nurture of faith in our youngest members. She also works closely with our Adult Youth Volunteers to plan and support their ministry with students in grades 5-12. Jerae is instrumental in the planning and support of many activities and



events designed to bring individual families and households together in fellowship and faith formation as the Holy Trinity family. Her work is generally behind-the-scenes coordination of people and resources to provide those opportunities for us. She does a lot of communicating directly with families of the parish, informing and inviting them to be involved in the life of the parish.

Jerae collaborates with her ecumenical colleagues in town to provide community Youth activities through the summer and on special occasions, such as Halloween. Jerae is generally at the church (in her office or in the Parish House preparing for Sundays) on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday between carpool lines (roughly 10:00 am to 1:00 pm), a daily "office" space where she actually manages to get an amazing amount of work done! FOCUS FOR OCTOBER/NOVEMBER: HOMELESSNESS MINISTRIES

Our Daily Rest in Seneca

Our Daily Rest, located in Oconee County, is a homeless shelter, emergency shelter, food bank and much more. This year, Our Daily Rest began programming to work with at risk folks to prevent them from becoming homeless in the first place. The program pays rent or utilities for eligible individuals or families who are in arrears and about to be evicted from their homes, and then connects them to additional social services that may be helpful in preventing future homelessness. Local contractors donate their services to help with home repairs. Your donations of time and money are welcome. Our own Kevin and Robbie Hughes, Mary Bowman and Judy Surak make special dinners for the residents. What are ways you can see yourself helping with this ministry?



Family Promise of Pickens County

The pandemic has really upset the normal workings of Family Promise of Pickens County. Homeless families in the program used to rotate weekly from church to church, with each church providing private rooms with beds and bed linens for the families, showers, study space for children and a hot fresh meals. Presently, families are having to be housed in hotel rooms, plus a few houses, which have been provided temporarily to the program by local churches. Family Promise is currently planning to return to its original rotational model. Holy Trinity took part in this rotation in the past, and we hope to be able to continue to honor our commitment to Family Promise in the future. **We will need leaders and workers to make this happen.** If you have an interest in this ministry, contact Rachel Rowe rrowe12@bellsouth.net to find out more.

Clean Start of Anderson County

Clean Start is a private 501C3 charity, totally dependent upon private donations. Their operating expenses are \$2,200 per month. They welcome tax-deductible donations.

Vintage Saints and Sinners: 25 Christians Who Transformed My Faith

Karen Wright Marsh, in addition to being the author of this lovely book, is the executive director and cofounder of Theological Horizons, a university ministry at the University of Virginia. Marsh connects her experiences in this ministry with her reflections on the lives and spiritual legacies of 25 "vintage" Christian exemplars, all of whom are both saints and sinners. The list of saints and sinners includes some familiar and expected names, such as Augustine of Hippo, Francis and Claire of Assisi, Ignatius of Loyola, and Mother Teresa. Others are more obscure and surprising: Amanda Berry Smith, Fannie Lou Hamer, and Sophie Scholl. Karen Wright Marsh deftly examines these lives in their complexity, bringing to light the struggles, doubts, and heartaches they experienced in their journeys through faith, reminding us that we have much more in common with these superstars of piety and commitment than we tend to think. These 25 reflections are short enough to read easily with a cup of coffee in the morning or during a noon break, and they pack sufficient wisdom for hours of fruitful contemplation.
