Keeping the Faith

Beloved Friends in Christ,

Lent 3A 2023 Exodus 17:1-1 John 4:5-42

Sometimes, but not always, I will look back on my notes and sermons from previous trips through the lectionary cycle. This year, preparing a sermon for the Third Sunday in Lent, I was reminded that the last time we had these particular readings was the first Sunday that we were shut down due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Third Sunday in Lent, 2020, was the first Sunday that we livestreamed a Sunday morning service. As I recall, Will and I led Morning Prayer from our dining room table. That weekend, we began the great sacrifices of the pandemic, figuratively splashed blood on the lintels of our doorways and boldly set out into the desert by staying home.

We thought we were heading into the wilderness for a few weeks--back by Easter, Pentecost at the latest. Little did we know. Little did we know how much we would sacrifice. We tried to keep count of the cost, spending endless hours doomscrolling the numbers: Numbers of cases, numbers of dead, numbers of jobs lost, numbers of businesses shut.

We're still actually trying to interpret the numbers: how do you figure average Sunday attendance when the only people in the church building are the priest, her husband, and the organist? How do you interpret the numbers who came back to in-person and the numbers who remain online and the numbers of those who have totally checked out?

We were the people of Israel in their distressing thirst. We were stuck in an unknown land, parched and afraid for the vulnerable ones in our communities. In some ways, we still are. We are the woman at the well at high noon, bringing our empty jug to be filled. And there it is --there it always has been. Water that will quench our thirst for ever.

From the mouth of God's Son, we hear: "Anyone who is thirsty may come to me! Anyone who believes in me may come and drink! For the Scriptures declare, 'Rivers of living water will flow from his heart.""

People are thirsty. They are parched--dry to the bone and seeking relief that only the Living Water can supply. The Israelites in the wilderness, the woman at the well, men, women, and children in our families and neighborhoods *thirst* for the water of life.

But what is this water of which Jesus declares that He is the source and which He promises to all? It is the life-giving water of grace, the only water capable of quenching our thirst. God has promised that when we follow faithfully, when we cry out to God, that water will be supplied. Not only that, we will become fountains flowing with the living water ourselves!

Lord, give us this water, so that we may not thirst. Let the water of life flow through us to bring forth beautiful flowers and abundant fruit in the wilderness of the world's indifference to the suffering and pain that is always the result of turning away from you. Let rivers of living water wash away the fear and anguish of these pandemic years and nourish new beginnings for this, your church. Let our hearts drink deeply of the Spirit's gifts and power to bring new life from the rich soil of this parish. We humbly ask for this living water in the Name of your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.

As we approach with gladness the Resurrection of our Lord and the celebrations of Easter-tide, remember that "God's mercies are new *every* morning. Great is God's faithfulness." The promise of Easter is that the Living Water will never fail. There will always be a spring, sometimes from the most unlikely source, that will sustain us in our mission and ministry.

Senior Warden's Report – Vestry Update March 2023

Be Patient, bearing with one another in love....

Ephesians 4:2-3, 7, 15

²Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. ³Make every effort to keep unity with the Spirit the bond of peace... ⁷But to each on of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it. ¹⁵...speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ.

The business of Holy Trinity quickly fills the allotted hour and a half (or two hours) leaving us little time for reflection. So, each year, your dedicated Vestry spends half a Saturday for getting to know each other a bit better. I would like to share you are few of the things we learned this year so you can appreciate this amazing group.

<u>SPIRITUAL GIFTS – OUR GRACES</u>. Mtr. Suz led us in a Lectio Divina on Ephesians 4:1-17, the theme of our February Orientation and Meeting. To learn more about our individual "graces", the Vestry completed and shared the results of a Spiritual Gifts inventory. God greatly blessed your Vestry with people with spiritual gifts that "Strengthen God's People" and "Show God's Love". Knowing our every need, God also blessed your Vestry with people that "Support Worshipping God," "Share God's Word" and "Sustain All Ministries." However, I must report that God did not see any need for anyone that speaks in tongues or interprets tongues.

BE PATIENT, BEARING WITH ONE ANOTHER IN LOVE. A discussion of Vestry norms and assignments helped us build a foundation to work together

as The Body of Christ. Dialogue and differences of opinion are part of how God works to be heard. Assuming positive intent, respectfully disagreeing and trust are critical to make sure we don't miss His message. Keeping the faith by always working for what is best for Holy Trinity and "speaking the truth with love" connect our work to God. This year, building on the work of your Vestry from 2018 through 2023, we started a "Vestry Handbook" Project that will include everything we learn each year.

<u>SPEAKING THE TRUTH IN LOVE</u>. Our guest, Mtr. Lynn Sanders, led us in a discussion of our 2023 Study of our Mutual Ministries process. As the EDUSC tells us, the goal is to make, equip and send mature disciples of Christ. The Vestry and our Ministry Leaders have completed questions to guide us in celebrating the ministry of ALL God's people, look at what is working and what needs attention. We look forward to sharing God's message to Holy Trinity through this process.

<u>Church Finance</u>. Bob Taylor taught us how to understand Holy Trinity financial statements and reports. We are grateful to have Bob as our Treasurer. Bob reported that we received an anonymous donation of \$35,500 donation towards the Trinity Place mortgage.

The Vestry plans to continue our dedicated, faithful service in so many ways. I look forward to sharing all the good news with you here. I am available on Sundays after the 8:00 AM service at breakfast or join me for Adult Fellowship at 9:30 AM.

To lift the burdens, loose the bands
Of pain; to bear My banner on - - - -,
Only by you My work is done.

I have no feet, save your own feet To carry far My message sweet; If they should fail, to every coast My steps are halt, My message lost.

I have no voice save your own voice; Through it alone shall hearts rejoice To know my tidings. If your tongue, Be silent, all my truths unsung.

I have no heart but your own heart
To beat for Me; to act love's part----,
O Child, though I am throned above,
I have no power save your love.

Your feet alone My race can run; By your own hands My deeds are done Your voice must speak, or Mine is still; My heart's great task, yours must fulfill.



March/April 2023 Tempo Financial Report Bob Taylor, Treasurer

January's plate offerings were several thousand dollars over budget and are reflected in the total year to date, being \$5,980.72 over budget. March pledge offerings were still below budget but higher than January and February. Prepaid pledges for the entire year increased in March and will help decrease the total income deficit of \$26,348.60, as prorated shares of prepaid pledges will be added to pledge offerings each month for the remainder of the year.

^{*}Special Note: An insurance check for water damages from the frozen/burst pipes in the Parish was entered as a negative expense, and the related expenses have not occurred and/or have not been invoiced yet.

A definite statement on expenses is difficult since repairs continue with damaged equipment associated with the early December electrical issues and the frozen/burst pipe in the Parish Hall. There are still major repairs to be made. One insurance reimbursement check for water damages has been received and credited against the expenses. The insurance claim for electrical damages will be filed after all repairs are completed, and invoices have been received. Aside from the repair expenses and expected insurance reimbursements, most other expenses are near budgeted totals for the end of March.

An anonymous gift of \$15,000 for a principal-only payment on the construction loan accounted for almost half of the \$36,804.620 decrease in the loan balance from January 1, 2023, to March 29, 2023.

This Joyful Eastertide

Had Christ, that once was slain, ne'er burst his three-day prison, our faith had been in vain; but now is Christ arisen, arisen, arisen.

The refrain from that great old Easter hymn, This joyful Eastertide, very succinctly summarizes the joy of the Great Fifty Days. Because Christ lived, died, and rose again, our faith is not in vain. Throughout this joyful Eastertide, we sing and shout alleluia, alleluia!



On April 23, we will celebrate the connections that are created when Christians pray for one another. All during Lent, volunteers have been praying for a child or youth in our parish. These Prayer Partners will meet and get to know each other at a special celebration. **Our Lenten Prayer Partners Celebration** takes place over lunch immediately following the 10:30 service on that day.

Also on April 23, we will celebrate the return of a beloved parish tradition, **A Proper English Tea! At 3:00**, the Parish Hall doors will open to ticket holders to enjoy a lavish and lovingly prepared English tea to benefit the St. Paul's Restoration Project. Tickets will be available after church services, in the church office, or may be reserved by calling Betty Snowden or Eunice Waddington.

The last Sunday of April will be a **Canterbury Sunday**, in which we celebrate our ministry with students, with a special recognition of our graduating Canterbears at the 10:30 service. That evening we will host a special Canterbury Supper to celebrate the 2022-2023 school year.

On May 21, we will **celebrate our young members who will graduate this year**—either from high school or college. Please let Jerae know if your young person is graduating this year so that he or she can be included in the recognition. We will also have a **Food Truck Family Fun time after the 10:30 service**.

Also on May 21, the Holy Trinity Chancel Choir will present a service of **Evensong at 5:00** at St. Paul's in honor of the Sunday after the Ascension. The occasion on which the risen Christ is taken into heaven after appearing to his followers for forty days (Acts 1:1-11, Mk 16:19). The Ascension marks the conclusion of Jesus' post-resurrection appearances. It is the final elevation of his human nature to divine glory and the near presence of God. The Ascension is affirmed by the Nicene and Apostles' Creeds.

Finally, on May 28, we celebrate the **Feast of Pentecost**. Pentecost means "the fiftieth day." The New Testament refers to Pentecost as the coming of the Spirit on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1), shortly after Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension. Christians came to understand the meaning of Pentecost in terms of the gift of the Spirit. The Pentecost event was the fulfillment of a promise which Jesus gave concerning the return of the Holy Spirit. In recent years, we have celebrated Pentecost by visiting our mother church, St. Paul's, for the 10:30 service, followed by a picnic in the churchyard.

Holy Trinity Clemson Outreach Committee and the Clemson Engineers for Developing Communities (CEDC) cordially invite you to join us for a delicious gourmet flounder dinner to be served in our parish hall at 6:30PM. This dinner will be lovingly prepared by our own Don Campbell with assistance from CEDC students and Holy Trinity members and will be elegantly served by our CEDC wait staff.

Following the dinner there will be a short presentation by the CEDC students and Reginald Cean, Haitian director of Partners in Agriculture and our Vocational School (CFFL) in the Central Plateau of Haiti. We will be introducing an EDUSC diocesan sponsored project to develop local production of tilapia fish food to supply the growing number of tilapia farms on Lake Peligre. This is a very exciting initiative to allow production of fish food using locally produced agricultural products as opposed to importing the fish food at considerably higher cost. More tilapia production provides a heart healthy protein source to a food insecure region of rural Haiti. A true WIN-WIN!

Tickets to the dinner will be limited to the first 200 subscribers at \$30 per ticket minimum. As much as we enjoy your company, this event is a fundraiser to support the diocesan effort to raise \$50,000 to get this project off the ground. The SAME*Garden

"I grew up on a 2 1/2 acre pig farm," says new SAME garden manager Michael Diemer. "My father said to me, 'There's seven of us at this table that we need to feed and you're gonna have to learn about gardens. Planning, seeds, planting and harvesting.' So, I became the farmer who fed our family."

"I don't see myself volunteering for a Haiti work trip, but I *can* see myself here in the SAME garden. It's something I can do to help others." That's because the garden's work is to provide healthy fresh produce for those in our community whose resources don't always allow for enough. We partner with Clemson Community Care (CCC) to help do it.

When garden founder, Beth Kunkel died suddenly in November, Michael bravely stepped up to fill in. He'd only been to the garden once. He hopes other parishioners might do the same. There are many ways to help out. "There are 3-4 gardens/year, including one in winter, dictating the cycle of helpers needed and tasks: carpentry (building raised beds), hauling, extra hands at harvesting times. He even sends out weekly 'what's up' emails before Tuesdays so you know if there's a way to pitch in to help.

The raised bed garden is in Trinity Place where there are newly constructed ones for luscious strawberries. Another area has just been designated for a small greenhouse where the gardeners hope to seed their own plants. The main focus in raised bed gardening is choosing plant varieties that are *compact but high volume producers*. Michael wisely asked the CCC staff, "What do *clients* ask for?"

The response? It's Clemson okra, collards and 'candy roaster' squash. Each of these much-loved squash plants puts out 52 lbs./season! Then there's the small but mighty musk melon plant that produces 12 super sweet fruits. "We're planting 6 of these, so... 144lbs.?" Wow!

Volunteer Anne Bryan says, "I was never a gardener, but I am a worker bee. Especially if it's beneficial to others. I just responded to Suz's Sunday call for garden volunteers, and it's been fascinating: thrashing benne seeds, harvesting peanuts and heirloom seed discoveries. Beth wanted us to experience the impact our produce donations could make by weighing and recording what we harvested before delivering to CCC."

"That was more than 300 lbs in 2022!" says our hands-on priest, Suz Cate whose 'happy place' is in the garden. When Michael asked her whether to go with 'quantity or exotic' in plant choices, Suz's resounding reply was: "Quantity!"

Like Anne, Rebecca Eidson had no gardening experience but thought it would be fun, with a purpose. She offers this invitation: "Just join us when you can! The importance of working side-by-side building community, continuing Beth's

legacy and growing support for each other is another benefit of taking part." The gardeners' quiet and devoted care of Beth during her illness is a moving testament of that. Robbie Grider says, "Beth's love of community is the focus I am always aware of when working in the garden."

Beth first started a garden at HT in response to diabetic and hypertensive patients she saw for nutrition and dietary counseling at the Clemson Free Clinic. To improve their health they needed more affordable, fresh produce in their diets. Several young parishioners' families helped her build the garden and raise bags of fresh produce for Clinic patients every Wednesday night.

Dr. Harry Morse regularly tells his patients as they head out the Clinic door with their produce bags, "There are more health benefits from what's in that bag than all the drugs we have in our pharmacy!"

Beth and Harry's work in our Haiti mission pointed out the implications of health disparities in resource-poor settings. Beth's response was a result of recognizing neighbors of our own with the same problems.

That *is* the reason for the SAME garden's work: impacting the health and well-being among neighbors in our community, especially those who may suffer from or are at higher risk for debilitating diseases. That's the target for growing our veggies!

After all, we could be growing and donating donuts along with those 'candy roaster' squash!



Education for Ministry is Forming for 2023-24

Education for Ministry (EfM), offered through the Theology program of the University of the South, is a small group program for adults who desire a deeper knowledge of scripture, church history, and theology. Groups are comprised of six to twelve adults, led by a mentor or two who guide and administer the group. Holy Trinity's EfM group meets on Monday evenings from 6:00 to 8:30 pm and we roughly follow the Clemson University class calendar from late August to early May. Our group meets by Zoom.

The weekly group meeting consists of prayer, discussion of the week's reading materials for each year and theological reflection. EfM is designed to deepen the participant's spiritual life through theological reflection, to help participants discern their ministry in daily life, and develop an informed and knowledgeable laity. Theological reflection is the core of EfM. EfM is open to non-Episcopalians but it is an Episcopal theology program.



The participant fee for the 2023-24 session cost is \$325 plus \$50-\$75 for books. Scholarships are available. If you are new to EfM, year 1 is for you, and if you've completed some part of EfM previously, you can pick up after the last year completed and continue with our group.

Who belongs to ECW? Why, any woman who is part of an Episcopal Church belongs to ECW! ECW exists to provide worship, formation, fellowship, and service opportunities for women in the Episcopal Church.
