Executive Summary of Holy Trinity's Mutual Ministry Study

Note: This Executive Summary and fuller report were provided to the Vestry and Rector by The Rev. Lynn Sanders. The fuller report can be accessed using the QR code provided.

Holy Trinity Clemson engaged in a Mutual Ministry Study (MMS) process September 2022 through April 2023. The timing for Holy Trinity's MMS seemed particularly appropriate, given that the parish has recently emerged from the unprecedented pandemic shutdowns of 2020-22, and that the previous Mutual Ministry Review was undertaken in 2018-19.



Holy Trinity Clemson engaged the Rev. Lynn Sanders, a retired Episcopal priest licensed to officiate in the Diocese of Upper South Carolina, to facilitate their MMS process. Lynn worked with Holy Trinity vestry members Betty Snowden and Harry Morse to design Holy Trinity's MMS process, with input and approval from the Rev. Suz Cate, rector, and Ellen Haase, senior warden.

In preparation for the MMS facilitated conversation between the rector and vestry, the rector, vestry members and ministry area leaders were asked to complete questionnaires. The confidential responses were "de-identified," aggregated and formatted, and provided to the rector and vestry ahead of their facilitated conversation.

The MMS facilitated conversation was held at Holy Trinity on April 1, with discussion sessions punctuated by worship times. The leadership team of rector and vestry discussed what they learned from the questionnaire responses, particularly focusing on what was learned during the pandemic shutdowns, how to characterize this past year of Holy Trinity's re-opening, parish strengths, opportunities, concerns, and a vision for Holy Trinity three years from now.

Finally, the team identified 3-month, 6-month and 1- year next steps/goals. The team identified that its overarching goal is to grow parish membership and engagement. While the 3-month goals are largely related to the vestry's organizing its own work in order to better serve the parish, the 6-month and 1-year goals directly support the overarching goal. It was noted that growing parish membership and engagement would positively affect the parish's financial resources, which would enable the parish to hire an assistant rector. For Holy Trinity to continue to offer — and grow — its wide array of program offerings and community connections, additional clergy support is needed.

Holy Trinity is clearly a vibrant parish, blessed with gifted, dedicated leadership, both clergy and lay. Its rector and vestry are smart, creative, compassionate thinkers and doers, possessing many talents and a wealth of knowledge among them, with a keen sense of humor to lighten the shared work of parish ministry, and a deep love for their parish. The rector and vestry are both willing and highly able to listen sensitively and look honestly at issues which need attention/improvement, and to take considered action when needed. They show a strong and evident commitment to continue building trust and teamwork among themselves and among the parish at large.

Equally important to note is the leadership's commitment to conducting an MMS-type process on a regular basis, as a way of keeping perspective, particularly valuable in changing times. As Holy Trinity continues its healthy emergence from the pandemic times and growth into the future, this MMS process may become the seed of a more robust strategic planning effort. Holy Trinity's many strengths and gifted leadership team are well equipped to meet the challenges of "being and doing church" amidst these times of change.

Love with the heart of Christ, think with the mind of Christ, and act in the world as the Body of Christ.

March/April 2023 Tempo Financial Report

Plate offerings continue to be over budget (by \$14,437.42 on April 30th), while pledge offerings continue to lag over the first four months (\$34,546.85 under budget on April 30th). Prepaid pledges for the entire year increased again in April and will help decrease the total income deficit of \$19,066.93, as prorated shares of prepaid pledges will be added to pledge offerings each month for the remainder of the year.

* **Special Note:** Insurance checks for December's water damages from the frozen/burst pipes in the Parish and the electrical issues were entered as negative expenses. One more repair of \$24,900 has not occurred and/or has not been invoiced yet.

The planned expenditure of \$24,900 for Parish Hall flooring will bring the total expenses for the year close to the budget. It appears that insurance reimbursements will almost cover the repairs of the damaged equipment associated with the early December electrical issues and the frozen/burst pipe in the Parish Hall.

Good progress continues to be made on the Trinity Place Loan with monthly payments and occasional additional principal-only payments from Doors gifts and parking revenues (no operating funds are used for the Trinity Loan payments).

HOLY WEEK & EASTER

Holy Week and Easter were observed and celebrated with Holy Trinity's traditional schedule of services. Holy Week began with solemn, quiet dignity in three evening Holy Eucharists, culminating with the Triduum, a three day liturgy that moves us from the Last Supper to the Resurrection. Easter Day was a glorious celebration that began with a sunrise service, continued with our wonderful Children's service with an Easter Egg Hunt following, and finishing with a magnificent Festive Holy Eucharist featuring our amazing Chancel Choir and guest instrumentalists. The final liturgy of the Easter Season was our annual pilgrimage to St. Paul's for Pentecost. As you can see from the accompanying pictures, many faithful people contributed their energy and talents to create wonderful experiences of the holiest time of the year—and we are grateful for each and every one!



SUMMER WORSHIP

June 4 begins our Summer of Worship. At this time, we are unable to offer Nursery or the Children's Chapel Liturgy of the Word. We will, however continue our First Sunday Children's Services, with a slight variation in July.

The First Sunday Children's Services feature an abbreviated Liturgy of the Word to allow all our children to remain in "big

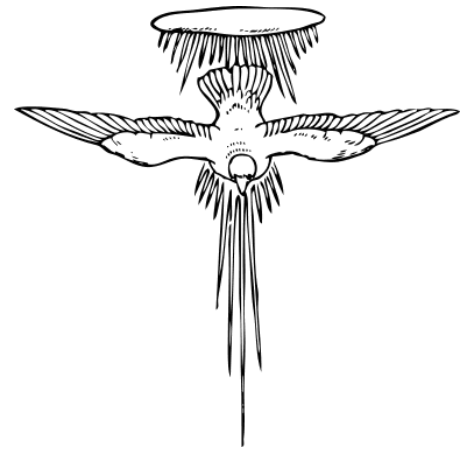
church" with us: we use one lesson, in addition to the Gospel, and the sermon is a children's message. Children and Youth serve as readers and acolytes, and there are special musical offerings provided by our children's choir and other young musicians.

The Children's services for the summer of 2023 will be on 6/4, 7/2, and 7/30. The Children's Service on July 30 will also feature our annual Backpack Blessing and is timed to coordinate with the beginning of the school year. We will move to a ONE SERVICE schedule for three weeks in July. On July 9, 16, and 23, there will be ONE SERVICE at 10:00 am in order to give our Altar Guild and Liturgical Ministers a bit of a break

while so many are away for summer vacations. The ONE SERVICE will be Rite II celebrations of Holy Eucharist with hymns. These three weeks offer us the opportunity to come together in worship as one congregation.

If you cross that boundary when the alarm is armed, it will go off—and it is heart-stoppingly loud! Haiti Outreach Dinner

Holy Trinity Outreach is planning a special evening in support of an exciting new diocesan-sponsored project in conjunction with our Clemson student partners, the Clemson Engineers for Developing Communities (CEDC). This dinner and fundraiser event will feature an informative presentation by Clemson faculty and parishioner David Vaughn and the CEDC students' new project initiative for Haiti.



The Clemson students, working with Haitian partners, are developing a system for locally producing a tilapia fish food to supply the Haiti's growing number of tilapia fish farms on Lake Peligre, which is in the Central Plateau of Haiti where our 40 year missions are located. This project would make possible the local production of fish food using locally produced agricultural products as opposed to importing the fish food made in the U.S. at considerably higher cost. The goal: more cost-effective tilapia production provides a heart-healthy protein source to a food-insecure region of rural Haiti. A mission with many benefits!



The dinner, prepared by beloved chef and parishioner Don Campbell with assistance from CEDC students and Holy Trinity members, will feature flounder (fish food, of course!) and will be served by the CEDC students.



Tickets for the dinner are now being sold at \$30 each. For Holy Trinity's part in the diocese's effort to raise \$50,000 for the Haiti fish food project, we welcome any donation you would be willing and able to make above this amount.

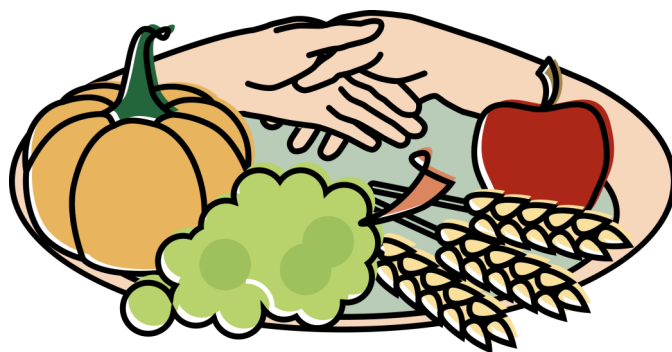

Food Insecurity Summer Update



And we thought last year was bad...

Every time I go to a Clemson Community Care (CCC) board meeting, I feel like I am drinking information from a firehose. This organization does so much for so many with the very generous donations of the Clemson/Central/Pendleton area community. But each year sees more need than the previous one, and, as we all know, the cost of food and other necessities keeps going up! We have so much, while so many have so little.

The number of clients at CCC needing food assistance in the first quarter of 2023 went up over 50% since the same quarter of 2022. The number of clients needing financial assistance for rent, power, water, home repairs, etc. more than doubled. The majority (73%) of clients are women with children. The stress of not being able to pay your bills or feed or clothe your children must take an incredible toll on these mothers. CCC also has a special category for Senior Food Boxes that they are tracking. This, too, I imagine is a growing population. In addition, the transient population in our community, mostly men, has increased noticeably in the last few years.

Each week, we post a list of food items needed by CCC. I know it's hard to remember to grab that bag of canned goods when you are rushing out the door on a Sunday morning, but donations are the life blood of organizations like CCC. What they don't receive in donations, they have to purchase. (And out of date goods, sadly, must be thrown away, so check the freshness date before you pull something off your pantry shelf!)

Lately, every time I go to Aldi, I try to throw a flat of something into my cart. They make it easy because everything sits on the shelves in flats! CCC needs more than food, too. They provide families with toilet paper, feminine products (Have you priced these lately?), paper towels, toothpaste, toothbrushes (How many of you have stored up a drawer full of toothbrushes that you get with each visit to the dentist?), shampoo, soap, deodorant, laundry detergent, etc.

Just put everything you want to donate in a bag or a box and bring it to the church or take it directly to CCC. They are open M-TH, 8:30-1:30 with easy access drop off behind the building.

I do not have client numbers from Our Daily Rest (ODR) in Seneca, but I am certain their numbers would reflect the same trend. Kevin Hughes, who volunteers there serving a warm meal to their clients once each month, told me about one client, Sadie and her three children, who had ended up homeless, living in a mobile trailer in the woods, but found their way to ODR. Now Sadie has a job and a roof over her children's heads. But even so, Kevin said it is hard for her to take care of their basic needs and still manage to provide decent clothes for three growing children! Kevin asked if I could help him make a SignUp Genius to seek donations of spring and summer clothing for the three children, ages 7, 8 and 10. You may have seen the link in HT Notes.
