Keeping the Faith—

Dear Friends in Christ,

We have come to the turning of the Church year. Advent begins on Sunday, December 3 this year. That means we've had a little more time between Thanksgiving and the beginning of the season, but it also means that we have the rare occurrence of Advent 4 and Christmas Eve occurring on the same day. We will have one service that morning—in the Parish Hall to allow our wonderful Altar Guild ample time to "Green the Church" for Christmas. We will have our usual three Christmas Eve services at the normal times and places (see page 7 for the full schedule).

We are also approaching the turning of the secular calendar to a new year. This annual resetting of the calendar naturally leads us to thoughts of reflection over the year that is ending and dreams for the year ahead. The year that is ending has been one of rebuilding, reviewing, and re-thinking. Our Mutual Ministry Study provided a good starting point for assessing the changes that have occurred locally and globally over the past three years. These changes have been significant, and it will take time to process their effects fully. Your Vestry and I will be working on that processing of change, with your input. The year that is ahead will be devoted to discerning and dreaming. Please pray with us for God's wisdom to guide us toward a vision for the future of Holy Trinity's ongoing mission and ministries.

To foster the kind of deep and careful listening that is required in such a process of discernment, I'm asking every member of Holy Trinity to commit to practices of prayer and reading Scripture. A daily practice is ideal, but some may need to ease into that. I have offered some

direction in the practice of *lectio divina* on page 22 in this newsletter. *Lectio divina* is simply "holy reading" as an aid to prayer. I encourage you to try it out for a few weeks and to continue with it if it proves to be helpful for your spiritual growth. I also encourage committees and small groups to begin each meeting or gathering with 5-10 minutes of this practice. It is a small thing, but it truly transforms the experience of being together. I hope you will give it a try.

Changes are happening all around us, throughout the fabric of our common lives. Praying and reading holy scriptures together strengthens our relationship with God and each other, which I believe is a key to building the kind of resilience that we all need in order to navigate the coming year. Please join us in this holy experiment—God only knows how it will all work out!

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

Tempo Article Senior Warden's Report – Vestry Update – December 2023

Our monthly Vestry meetings are packed with so much important business, to share it all would fill several pages. So, this Vestry update focuses on progress on a couple of important initiatives identified in the 2023 Mutual Ministry Study.

Assistant Rector. A top priority for Holy Trinity Episcopal Parish is to call an assistant rector to lead Canterbury and support our Parish life. The orig-



inal reason for the founding and location of Holy Trinity was to serve the Clemson University community. The importance of this mission for Holy Trinity was reaffirmed over the past several years with the acquisition and improvements to Trinity Place and the renovations for Canterbury in the lower level of the Parish Hall. To responsibly call an assistant rector, Holy Trinity needs a sustained financial commitment similar to the financial commitment made for Trinity Place.

Our stewardship campaign had an extended goal to support adding the assistant rector to the 2024 budget. We pray that the generous pledged gifts from parishioners will achieve this goal. A committee consisting of Ellen Haase, Jan Cribb, Jim Reed, Bob Taylor, Bill Purkerson and Charlie Curtis has been established to explore ways to sustainably fund and recruit our next assistant rector. Your prayers and support for the activities of this subcommittee and for successfully calling our next assistant rector will be greatly appreciated.

<u>Vestry Discernment and Transition</u>. Leadership is vital to the future of Holy Trinity. Each year we seek members of the Parish who feel called to serve our church on the Vestry to replace those whose terms are ending. The Vestry offered a discernment session in November to share the roles, responsibilities, and many blessings of Vestry service. Information was be provided about expectations and time commitments. If you feel God calling you to Vestry service now or possibly in the future, contact a Vestry member to get more information. Look for Vestry ballots starting on 4 December 2023. New Vestry members will be provided time to get up to speed and be supported during their transi-



tion so we can continue to lead Holy Trinity on the mission and ministry God has set for us.

Thank you, Stewardship Ministry! Please join me in thanking our Stewardship Ministry Team for their extraordinary work in guiding us in our prayerful consideration of how we act as stewards of the many blessings God has given us.

Parish-wide Survey. Preparing, launching, and analyzing a survey requires considerable time, effort, and knowledge. Our Survey team of Hap Wheeler, Mel Harriss, Andrew Baker, and Kathy Crouse produced a superb tool to gather information to guide the Vestry as we make plans for our future. Thank you to everyone who has taken time to prayerfully complete the survey.



Holy Trinity Stewardship Ministry Update

Our 2024 Stewardship Campaign is well underway and we graciously thank our many Parish Families who have supported this campaign with their pledges of time, talent and treasure. For 2024, our Finance Committee set a Stewardship goal of \$470,000 to support the Mission and Ministry of Holy Trinity. We currently have received **88** pledges for a total of **\$423,594**.

The more we embrace and understand the Stewardship way of life, the more our Parish will grow and flourish. We ask that if you have not pledged to please prayerfully consider making a pledge. Every pledge is important no matter how large or small. We are also asking for your support of our Ministries with your time and talent.

Let's help keep Holy Trinity the beacon of light, love, faith and hope that it has long been for our beloved community.

Plate offerings through October 31, 2023 are \$16,631.96 above budget. Pledge offerings for the year are above budget by \$6,968.00 on October 31st. Consequently, total income through October 31st is more than twenty-four thousand dollars above budget.

Scheduled expenses in November and December will bring the total expenses closer to budget at year's end, but Holy Trinity has been very fortunate this year with very few costly repairs. Unless there are unexpected large expenses/repairs in November or December, expenses will total less than budgeted by several thousand dollars for 2023.

The major reduction in the Trinity Place Loan Balance in 2023 is due to the principal-only payment of \$500,000 from Beth Kunkel's property sale. A few generous parishioners' gifts for principal-only payments have also significantly reduced the loan balance. The loan's originally scheduled payoff of February 2040 has been reduced to April 2031. Football parking revenues and merchant parking revenues are above budget for the year, and Door gifts are near the budget for the year. Thus, Trinity Place funds continue to be sufficient for the monthly \$8,933.77 on the \$1.57 million 2020 construction loan, which is Holy Trinity's only indebtedness. Consequently, it is anticipated that, again, in 2024, all plate and pledge offerings can be designated for Holy Trinity's programs and missions.

Advent: A Time of Preparation

The Season of Advent is a sacred time that allows us many opportunities to watch and wait for the coming of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Another name for Jesus we use especially in Advent is Emmanuel, God-with-us. Emmanuel is the Name that reminds us that God chose to live among us, as one of us, being born to Mary in humble



circumstances. We also watch and wait for the Second Coming of the Messiah, the Christ, in great glory. In the tension between these two very different Advents, we also watch and wait for the daily visitation with Christ that happens as we pray, read holy scripture, and serve those whom Christ particularly loves, the poor and lowly of the earth. Resources for observing Advent at home will be provided on the First Sunday of Advent when we gather in the Parish Hall to make Advent wreaths and have lunch together.


You will notice several differences in our worship during Advent. The seasonal changes in our worship and in our worship space are meant to call our minds to the themes and moods of the current Liturgical season. Visual cues ae a change of color in the vestments worn by the priest, the presence of the Advent wreath, and the lighting of the wreath. You will hear the choir's Introit, a couple of stanzas of O come, O come Emmanuel as the wreath is lit. The hymns will support the Advent themes of preparation, expectation, and contemplation. The collects will highlight the sense of expectation as we move through the Advent Season. We will use Eucharistic Prayer B, with its Incarnational language and imagery. The final blessing will follow the forms provided for seasonal blessing. All of these elements are designed to lead us more deeply into the preparation for the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ, celebrated in the Christmas Season.



Christmastide: A Time of Celebration

Christmastide is the name that designates the Twelve Days of Christmas, beginning with Christmas Eve. The liturgical color is celebratory white, and the churches will be decked with greenery. We will begin our celebration with **Lessons & Carols at St. Paul's on December 17 at 5:00**. This is not technically within Christmastide, but with a foreshortened Advent Season, this is logistically the best time for the beloved tradition of "hearing the story of salvation through the reading of scripture and singing of carols."

The creche will be the focus of our **Children's Service at 4:00 on Christmas Eve at Holy Trinity**. Our resident artisan woodworker, Chesley Rowe, has created a new, larger, and more visible creche that is quite lovely. The accompanying picture provides the "legend" of the creche's source materials. Of special interest is the information that the "floor, back, and roof of the creche are yellow pine salvaged from the original floor of Holy Trinity Church built in 1899."



Our Traditional Christmas Eve Service at Holy Trinity at

7:00 will feature our favorite string trio and Christmas Choir. The final service of the night will be an **Almost Midnight Christmas Mass at St. Paul's at 10:30.** Finally, on Christmas morning, we will have our **Christmas Day Service in the Parish Hall at 10:00**. At this service, we prepare Christmas Dinner for Clemson Meals on Wheels clients in lieu of a sermon—what better way to respond to the story of Christmas? Details about contributing prepared dishes for this ministry are located on page 12 of this newsletter.



Report from your CCC Board representative Rachel Rowe:

Each month we keep setting records, many of which we'd rather not set! Record for most clients seen, most food distributed, and worse yet, lowest food inventory to date. Consequently, we are having to purchase more food items



each week just to fill the bags with basic items to feed our clients and their families. These days, we rarely have any 'extras' to give them, for example, coffee, tea, condiments, personal hygiene products, and paper products. These extras are relatively expensive things that we take for granted in our own lives. Please keep CCC in mind when you do your weekly grocery shopping or if any of your clubs are looking for an outreach project.

Family Promise of Pickens County was established to serve the

A team warms up those dishes that need to be served hot and prep for packaging the meals for delivery. The actual packaging takes place in the Parish Hall as the "sermon" for the Christmas Day Holy Eucharist. The congregation for the service works with the cooking team to package and box up the meal for the route drivers to deliver to their clients. This is a special and very moving way to celebrate the birth of the Christ Child.

Rise Against Hunger A note from your Outreach Committee

We were recently contacted by a member of The Church of the Ascension in Seneca, requesting support for their joint efforts with Walhalla Presbyterian Church to address global hunger through the Rise Against Hunger organization. This year, Ascen-

sion and Walhalla Pres joined together to sponsor an assembly line-like process meal packing event at which they packed 10,000 meals in 2 hours. The way Rise Against Hunger works is to provide everything needed for these local events down to the music, stylish hairnets and stories of true impact to give your team a fun and team-building experience. What you provide is funding and labor. Not only are you making a huge impact worldwide, but you are sharing in the lives of those in your group. The events can be multi-generational from the oldest to the youngest finding a place in the assembly process.

The assembled vacuum-sealed meals provided by Rise Against Hunger, contain 20 vitamins and minerals, and include local regionally-procured food items to meet a specific community's needs. Rise Against Hunger safe-

ty net programs not only provide nourishment, but also support for education, skills training, and health services that aid the difficult journey out of poverty.

SAME Garden Supports Those in Need



Adult Formation Growing in Christ—what does it mean?

Growing in Christ is a phrase that we use to describe both the process and the impact of spending time getting to know our Lord through worship, prayer, reading the Bible, and serving our neighbors. It is also the title we use in our communications with the parish to indicate that we are talking about opportunities to learn and grow in our faith. Our Family Ministry, Adult Formation, and Worship Leadership programs offer opportunities to strengthen your connection to the source of life that is unlike any other. Some of those occur regularly, like our Sunday School classes for Adults, Children's Church, Bible studies, and Education for Ministry. Others occur seasonally, like Advent Reflections (see below), Discovery Class, and Lenten Soup Suppers. Others are occasional, such as Food for Thought, or retreats. I encourage you to find one or more of these opportunities to get connected on a deeper level with God and with other Christians. If you are looking for islands of peace, oases of joy, havens of love in your life, this is the place to be!



Advent

Advent is the perfect time to find some peace and calm in your life. The practices for marking this special season are simple and classic: Light a candle (or two, or three, or four), read a short Bible passage, say a prayer. Gaze silently at the gentle glow of the candle. Repeat daily. We have resources to help you in this practice. On December 3, we will gather in the parish hall to create Advent wreaths and distribute supplies to support your practice. See also the review of *Prepare the Way*, from Forward Day by Day.

Advent Reflections

I will invite those who are interested to join me weekly for a brief time of reflection on the readings in *Prepare the Way.* We will meet by Zoom on Wednesdays at noon; the link will be shared in HT Notes. This will be an informal discussion, an opportunity to check in with others who are trying to create space in their lives for the Advent Miracle: slowing down and getting quiet, if only for a moment. If your schedule allows, please join us.

Epiphany

Epiphany is the season of getting to know Jesus Christ as he is revealed in the Bible. We read stories of his special appearances, miracles, and teachings. We ponder the meaning of his life for us and our response to that meaning. We celebrate God-with-us, Emmanuel, who invites us to live a life like no other—in him. The season extends from January 6 to Shrove Tuesday, which in on February 13 this year.

Discovery Class

Each year, I offer a 6-8 week class designed to introduce newcomers to Holy Trinity and The Episcopal Church, as well as reviewing the basics of the Christian faith as we practice it in the Anglican Tradition. I also love to have people join us who have been practicing their faith here for some time, because you all have such wisdom and insight to share about this wonderful parish. Please see the flier that is included on the next page for specific details.

Join the Good Book Club!

The Good Book Club is an offering from our good friends at Forward Movement. It is an invitation to all Episcopalians to join in reading the Bible as a community. Episcopalians will read a section every day through the Epiphany season. In surveys taken before and after the first Good Book Club project in 2018 (reading the Gospel of Luke and the Book of Acts), participants reported growth in their understanding of scripture and a deepening of their prayer life. Perhaps most significantly, the percentage of people who reported reading the Bible on a daily basis increased to 73% at the end of the first Good Book Club reading, from 45% percent when it began.





Already, individuals, congregations, and organizations have com-

mitted to being a part of the Good Book Club, and we hope you'll join the journey too! For our journey through scripture during Epiphany 2024, the Good Book Club will explore *The Book of Genesis*. Mark your calendars to join the Good Book Club with daily scripture readings, reflections, and teachings, during Epiphanytide. Discovery Class 2024

Thursday Nights 1/11-2/22 at 6:00 pm

In this seven-session class we use our hearts, minds, and imaginations to explore the various aspects of life as Anglican Christians at Holy Trinity and in The Episcopal Church. This year, we will follow the structure and teaching of an excellent book by Scott Gunn and Melody Wilson Shobe, *Walk in Love: Episcopal Beliefs and Practices.* This class is open to all who are interested in learning more about The Episcopal Church, whether you are a cradle Episcopalian or are just checking us out.

1/11 Session One: The Anglican Way of Christianity—an exploration of the Anglican or Episcopal understanding of prayer. *Chapter 1*

1/18 Session Two: Sacraments and Sacramental Life—we will spend most of our time on Baptism and Holy Eucharist, because they are the primary sacraments, but we will make sure to introduce the other Rites: Confirmation or Reception, Marriage, Reconciliation of a Penitent, Unction, and Ordination. *Chapters 2-5 (Chapters 6-8 recommended)*

1/25 Session Three: Marking Time—a look at the daily, seasonal, and yearly marking of time in our liturgical traditions, concluding with the end of our earthly pilgrimage: funerals and burial. *Chapters 9-12*

2/1 Session Four: Basic Beliefs—a discussion of Creeds, sin and grace, and how all of those big ideas are founded in our Holy Scriptures. *Chapters 14-16*

2/8 Session Five: The Church—beginning broadly, we will get to know the people who have followed Jesus since the first disciples were called in Galilee, then we'll spend some time with the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement, and then we'll talk about how we are called to follow Jesus. *Chapters 17-20*

2/15 Session Six: A Trinitarian Life—our life together as followers of Jesus calls us out of ourselves to participate in God's work of care of creation and each other. Our tradition points to the various tools and resources we have for that work. *Chapters 21-23*

2/22 Session Seven: What's Next?— by this time, we'll be ready to talk about ethics, praxis, and evange-lism (oh my!). These things aren't as scary as they sound, but they are frightfully important to engaging fully in the life of Holy Trinity. *Chapters 24-26*

Spiritual Resources

African Bible Study Method: Lectio divina for Individuals and Groups

What is lectio divina?

Lectio divina means, quite simply "holy reading." Lectio divina encompasses a variety of methods for reading our Holy Scriptures prayerfully, with the intention of listening for the Word (the mind, the will, the person of God in Jesus Christ) in our hearts, minds, and imaginations. In listening, it is always important to pay attention to physical sensations, "random" thoughts, and emotional responses to what we are hearing.

The reading of our Holy Scriptures is a foundational practice of our faith. God is reliably present in the text (although it may take some diligent searching to find that presence sometimes). The best, most effective *study of Scripture is undertaken in community*. *Hearing other voices read and contemplate the texts expands our understanding beyond our own, limited reading*. *However, the in-dividual reading of Scripture contemplatively and prayerfully allows the text to speak to us with that soft whisper of the Holy Spirit within. The African Bible Study Method works for either of these purposes.*

How does the African Bible Study Method work?

This Bible study method was introduced at the Lambeth Conference, a gathering of bishops of the Anglican Communion that takes place every ten years. It is known by both names: "Lambeth" and "African." When used in a group setting, there is no discussion of the insights that are shared—the intent is to listen closely to what each person says and to accept it without comment.



Opening Prayer: O Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning. Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our savior Jesus Christ. *Amen*.

The passage is read aloud slowly three times. (An individual using this method may choose to read silently.) Each time the passage is read, listen with the following prompts in mind, each in order. Journal and/or share briefly (in a group setting share no more than a sentence or two) in response to each reading and prompt.

First time: listen for a single word or phrase that catches your attention or "lights up" for you.

Second time: listen for how God is speaking to your life in this moment through the text.

Third time: listen for what God is calling you to do or change *in the future or from this moment through the text and your responses to this point.*

Close with the Lord's Prayer.

How are Bible passages chosen?

There are many ways to choose a passage for lectio divina. The key is to find a passage of sufficient length and cohesiveness to provide for fruitful contemplation, yet not so long and complex that it is hard to find a focal point. Generally speaking, Gospel readings for the Daily Offices are a good place to start. These can be found easily in the Forward Day by Day pamphlets available in the tract rack in the narthex or the church office. The Forward Movement website

(found <u>here</u> or via the QR code) is very helpful, as well. Of course, you can always find those readings in the Book of Common Prayer!

Another tactic would be to choose a book of the Bible and read your way through it. The Good Book Club mentioned on page x is reading the Book of Genesis during the Season of Epiphany. Reading day by day through the Gospels or one of Paul's letters is another good way to practice *lectio divina*. *Remember: this is not a scholarly study of Scripture-it is a prayerful, holy reading*. *I encourage you to give daily time with the Bible a try. If I can be helpful to you in this practice, please don't hesitate to ask*.

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Communíty

Red Door Dinners

One of the beloved traditions of many Episcopal parishes is gathering for food and fellowship together. In many parishes, Red Door Dinners is a greatly appreciated way of getting people together in homes or restaurants for that purpose. The thing that makes this approach truly special is that groups are formed that will meet 3 or 4 times, which allows participants to get to know each other quite well. Many lasting friendships have begun in these groups.

In mid-December, we will send out a signup link inviting those who are interested to sign up for 3-4 monthly Red Door Dinners beginning in January. Participants will be divided into groups of 8-10 people, depending on the preferences you indicate. All who sign up by January 13 will be invited to a potluck dinner in the Parish Hall on January 20. At that time, dinner groups will be announced, and



the groups will sit together to share the meal, plan their first supper as a group, and take part in a practice of brief Bible reading and prayer that is suggested for each gathering. Watch for that sign up in the second week of Advent.
