Keeping the Faith

Beloved in Christ,

It is so good to be back with you all after a few weeks of adventuring around the northeastern part of our great country with Will. We had a grand time reconnecting with family and old friends—and each other. It was a grand adventure, and I am so grateful for having that opportunity to wake up in a new place every few days. I was often reminded of T.S. Eliot's lines from "Little Gidding."

We shall not cease from exploration
And the end of all our exploring
Will be to arrive where we started
And know the place for the first time.

Fr. Thomas Keating, the founder of Contemplative Outreach, writes that "God is like a farmer preparing the soil of our soul to bear not just fortyfold or sixtyfold, but a hundredfold. This means that the soil must be well-tilled." This tilling takes place in our prayers, and that means not just the petitions and intercessions, important though they are. The tilling is most effective in the silence of our hearts, wherein we gaze upon God and see that God is always gazing at us in pure love. For those who struggle with that silence in stillness, a walking prayer can be a Godsend.

I had several opportunities to walk labyrinths during my times at Sewanee, which bookended my sabbatical. If you've ever walked a labyrinth yourself, you know that in the course of your circumambulations, you do indeed arrive at the end where you have started. If you have used your time as a walking meditation with God, the world looks like a different place when you step out of the labyrinth.

Leadership Communication

If you haven't had the opportunity to walk a labyrinth, then think of it like this: the labyrinth is a pilgrimage to the center, in which your body may travel a few hundred steps, but your spirit may travel to the presence of God. A common practice is to travel inward with prayers for letting go of those things that come between you and God. Once you've reached the center, there is time to rest in the presence of God, offering prayers of gratitude and adoration. As you work your way back to the beginning, you might turn your prayers to those insights and nudges from the Spirit to carry back out into the world.

This is the pattern of the Spirit-led life. Spend time with God in prayer; be renewed, equipped, and led into action in the world. The ministries of outreach and service that are so important to the life of this parish depend on the power of the Holy Trinity to bear fortyfold, sixtyfold, or even a hundredfold.

Notes from Senior Warden, Mel Harriss!



Here we are, August, 2024. Schedules are filling up—school is starting, football and soccer games are scheduled. Election Campaigns are in full swing. Traffic is increasing. Our Stewardship Campaign will kick off in September. Our Football Parkers will be arriving on game day to cheer the Tigers and tailgate. Our Parking Volunteers will welcome them. It was a productive meeting but made it clear that more work is needed as we move forward. If you are serving on a Committee, expect to hear from your Vestry liaison within the next few weeks to discuss the findings in your area and develop a list of actions that could be taken to address the findings. The Vestry will be meeting in September to review the list of actions and define how to proceed. We are blessed to have members of the Vestry who have years of project management experience and are stepping up as servant leaders as we move forward. Please continue to pray for Holy Trinity Parish.

One of the joys of my time on the Vestry and this year as Senior Warden has been the opportunity to get to know more of you better. I love that we are seen as welcoming. As we look forward to Clemson's fall semester, I hope that each of you will take time before or after services to welcome those worshipping with us—old friends, Clemson students, faculty and staff, EDS families, people you have seen in services but haven't met before. We all appreciate the fact that we are seen by others and welcomed into the fellowship of Holy Trinity. If you have a Holy Trinity name tag, wear it so that all may know your name. 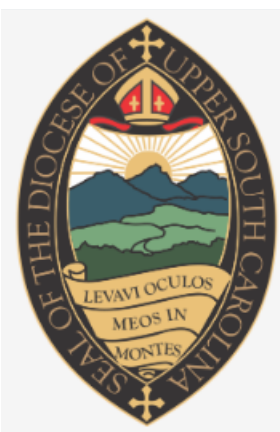

Stewardship 2024

****STEWARDSHIP**, spelled backwards. No matter how you spell it though, you must conclude that Stewardship is the lifeblood in accomplishing our Parish mission. That Mission, as we conceive it through thought and prayer, and making the projection of that mission to our church family, our neighbors, and to the world. **Sept. 15th** will be our **kick-off Sunday** for our **2025 Stewardship Drive**, when we'll have a catered barbecue lunch in the Parish Hall, and project our Stewardship activities and Milestones planned for the Fall. We ask that in preparation for that event and the following drive that you open your heart to God's guidance in your part of our drive and Mission.

Our 2025 Drive Theme is built around the subjects of **Heritage, Home, Hope**. (see graphic below). The Stewardship Committee thinks our mission is defined by those subjects: **Heritage**: enthusiasm and courage from what we were able to accomplish in the past; **Home**: Remembering that Holy Trinity is not just a Parish, but a Christian Home, where we can always feel Christian love for each other, and learn to project that love to all people; **Hope**: Praying for God's guidance and help in determining our goals as a Parish as we look to the future.



ST. PAUL'S RESTORATION PROJECT

Here's the Latest...

The repainting efforts were halted in late November, 2023 by the construction company awarded the business to tackle this project (TRH Construction). The reason cited was due to temperatures being too low in the late Fall / Winter months for the new paint to bond properly. Then, our Parish received an insurance pay-out in January, 2024 to replace the roof at St. Paul's due to hail damage from a storm event earlier in 2023. This raised the basic question – does it make sense to re-start the restoration / repainting efforts, knowing there is also a roof project looming? After consulting with several historical restoration entities (Preservation South, Pendleton Historic Foundation, Clemson University – just to name a few) – the recommendation was pretty consistent. The church was advised to put the restoration / repainting project on-hold until after the roof gets replaced. This was presented to the Vestry and it was agreed in the Spring. Now we are exploring roofing material options that will hopefully mimic the original roof system from back in 1822. Unfortunately, the current roof at St. Paul's is sagging significantly on both sides, so weight and a structural analysis needs to be factored into our plans. We hope to see the roof project finalized late in 2024, which will then allow for the repainting / restoration efforts to resume (likely in the Spring of 2025).



The good news is we have been blessed by the generosity of members of our Parish / community. To date we have raised ~\$159,800 towards restoring St. Paul's (not just repainting, but also replacing old / rotted wood as needed amongst other things). We have paid \$31,860 towards the work completed thus far (most of which can be seen in the upper section of the exterior wall facing Queen Street). The process of removing the old paint has been proving to be more time consuming than originally expected. The majority of the work completed to date was done in 2023. Other needs of the property have also come into light over the past several months – especially the need for an arborist to address any aging trees that are showing signs of distress that can potentially damage the church +/- or historic tombstones in the churchyard. We have had 2 storm related incidents so far this year that impacted parts of the property at St. Paul's. We certainly don't want to see anything get damaged after spending time and \$\$\$ on a new roof or re-painting effort. The plan is to address issues of this nature in parallel with the new roof, and the intent is to preserve all of the \$\$\$ raised for the restoration tasks that were put on hold. The insurance pay-out should cover the costs to replace the roof with similar material. Time will tell if we will be able to utilize other material options mentioned above that would better resemble construction styles used in the 1820's. Funds for the restoration of St. Paul's will continue to be collected and will be held for the purposes of restoration

July 2024 Tempo Financial Report

Halfway through Holy Trinity's 2024 Financial year, income and expenses continue to be close to operating and Trinity Place budgeting. Operating income to date exceeds operating expenses to date by \$3,028.93.

* **Special Note:** Budgeted Year to Date Expenses less than Budgeted Year to Date Income reflects salary adjustments not going into effect until February 1st following the Vestry's official approval of the 2024 Statement of Mission in January 2024.

A review of an anonymous spreadsheet of contributions showed several pledging households slightly behind schedule but revealed no areas of major concern. Expenses to date, which are \$5,567.09 less than the budget, reflect the good fortune of very few unexpected maintenance expenses and good work by our Junior Warden, Chris Heerwagen. With continued good fortune, cumulating income will continue to stay a few thousand dollars above cumulating expenses.

Most of the 2024 football parking revenues have been received from patrons for their season parking places in the Trinity Place area. Moreover, Doors contributions have been steady. Consequently, the Trinity Place funds are very adequate for the monthly payments of \$8,933.77 for the short-term. Since the 5-year Doors pledge campaign which began September 30, 2019 will end September 30, 2024, it is important to consider a sustainable long-term plan for the only remaining Holy Trinity loan.

An anonymous review of all Doors contributions through June 30, 2024, yielded the following observations:

- An overwhelming majority of Doors pledging units completed their pledges.
- A few Doors pledging units exceeded their pledges.
- A few Doors pledging units still need to complete their pledges.

This was an unbelievably successful capital campaign that attests to the generosity of the Holy Trinity Parishioners. The successes include:

- The original acquisition loan for the Trinity Place property was retired in April 2021.
- The demolition loan for the old Methodist church building was retired in November 2022.
- The original \$1,570,000 construction loan (taken in February 2020) has been reduced by 60 percent, and the payoff for this 20-year construction loan has been reduced by almost 9 years.

The interest rate on the current construction loan is 3.3% and must be re-negotiated in February 2027. With Holy Trinity's excellent asset to debt ratio, no problems are anticipated in re-negotiating the loan except for the likelihood of a much higher interest rate. A higher interest rate would necessitate a higher monthly payment or an extending the life-time for the loan. Consequently, a wise course of action would be for Doors contributions to continue in support of an aggressive pay-down of the loan balance prior to February 2027.

Worship Committee Welcomes New Members



The elements of our worship that are used at the altar. Our Head Usher, Beth Newton, organizes and recruits our ushers. The leaders of these worship support ministries have been meeting in an ad hoc fashion in recent years, and we are now reconvening as a full committee to respond to input from the parish-wide survey from last year.

The Worship Committee works with the Rector to assess and plan for our public worship services at Holy Trinity and St. Paul's. There are several ministry teams involved in each act of worship, and they are all represented on the Worship Committee. Our Music Ministers, Rebecca Bowman, Trey Williams, and Cynthia Spejewski take turns attending meetings to provide insight on seasonal and occasional music for our liturgies. Our Altar Guild Chairs, Anna and Jack McKenna and Kathy Woodard represent the guild of behind-the-scenes servant ministers who set up, clean up, and take care of all

In addition to these ministry leaders, we have at-large members who provide input on the perspective of worship from the pew. Cheryl DeSellier attends our 8:00 service, and Beth Gilmore attends our 10:30 service and brings the perspective of a parent of young twins. Mark Stokes is our Vestry Liaison, who will assist us in our work for the Vestry in response to the survey and to communicate our recommendations back to them.

Once this particular task is completed, we will continue to meet seasonally (following the seasons of the church's liturgical calendar) to plan together for worship that reflects the riches of our Episcopal/Anglican heritage. We would love to have someone representing the St. Paul's worshipping congregation on the committee. If you would be interested in serving on this committee, or if you have suggestions, please contact me, Mtr. Suz, or another member of the committee.

Holy Trinity and the Episcopal Day School—Growing in Christ Together



Holy Trinity Episcopal Day School is a true ministry of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church. For over 60 years, EDS has been the most outward-facing ministry of Holy Trinity, serving families from a diversity of elements of our community: generational residents of the Clemson area, graduate students, foreign students, and families connected to Clemson University.

The relationship between Holy Trinity and EDS is symbiotic, each enriching the life of the other. Holy Trinity provides space and pays for the utilities used in that space, but otherwise, EDS pays for salaries, supplies, equipment, and

other costs of the operations of the school. In return, Holy Trinity benefits from the presence and energy of the school, as well as the knowledge that the significant investment in our Parish House of time, money, and effort is put to use for the benefit of the community and the spread of the Gospel.

At the Episcopal Day School, God is present in school activities. As a church school, The Episcopal Day School helps each student to understand that the knowledge and service of God and humankind lie at the heart of wisdom. Children attend daily chapel where they learn about God, Jesus and The Holy Spirit through stories, songs, and recitations. Over the course of the year, they hear the stories of the Old Testament and New Testament. One of the highlights of the week is when Mother Suz leads them in Chapel each Wednesday.

Enrollment has increased for the 2024-2025 school year with over 60 students set to receive an education in a Christian environment in 2K, 3K and 4K. Learning is fostered through daily lessons and activities as well as the play-based curriculum, Learning Without Tears, that addresses readiness and writing, language and literacy, and numbers and math. The feedback from area schools is that the students who received their preschool education at the Episcopal Day School are well prepared for 5K.



The expansion of our enrollment this year has necessitated the transformation of the St. Francis Chapel into a classroom to accommodate an additional 4K “Red Bird” class. The Chapel services will move to the Parish Hall. When you go into the Parish Hall, you will notice a small altar has been placed at one end. The space is designed to be flexible so that other functions in the Parish Hall will be affected minimally. That space will not only serve as the Chapel for EDS, but it will also serve the children of the parish as their Chapel for their Liturgy of the Word on most Sunday mornings. Many of the children who will attend services there on Sunday morning also attend Chapel there each weekday. This is another lovely way in which the symbiotic relationship between church and school is realized as these children grow daily in their love of Christ in at Holy Trinity.

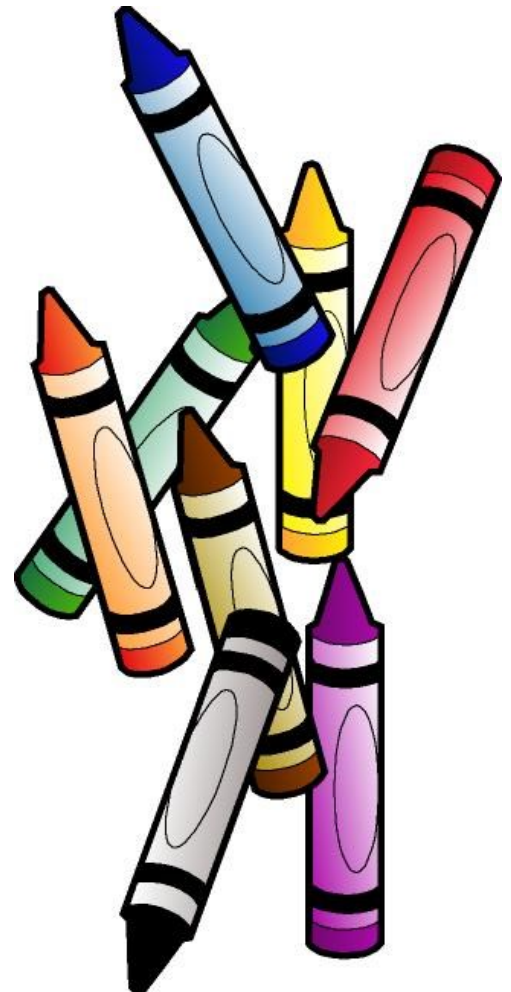


EDS Scholarship Assistance

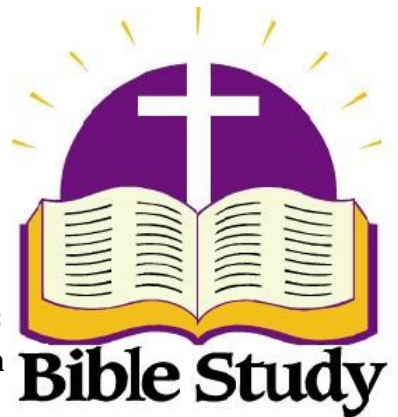




Adult Formation at Holy Trinity

We are always being formed into something—as Christians, we are exhorted to be transformed by our life in Christ. Adult Formation at Holy Trinity offers opportunities to learn and grow in community with other Christians to be equipped for loving and serving God and our neighbors. There are several weekly offerings, and some that occur monthly or seasonally or annually. The list offered below includes those Adult Formation opportunities that will either resume or continue as we begin our program year. Take a look and see how you might grow in Christ this fall.

- **Education for Ministry (EfM)** is a small group program for adults who desire a deeper knowledge of scripture, church history, and theology. Our 36-week seminar year begins August 26 and there are openings for enrollment. The weekly group meeting consists of prayer, discussion of the week's reading materials for each year and theological reflection. The participant fee for the 2024-25 year is \$350 plus \$50-\$75 for books. Scholarships are available—contact Mtr. Suz for more info. 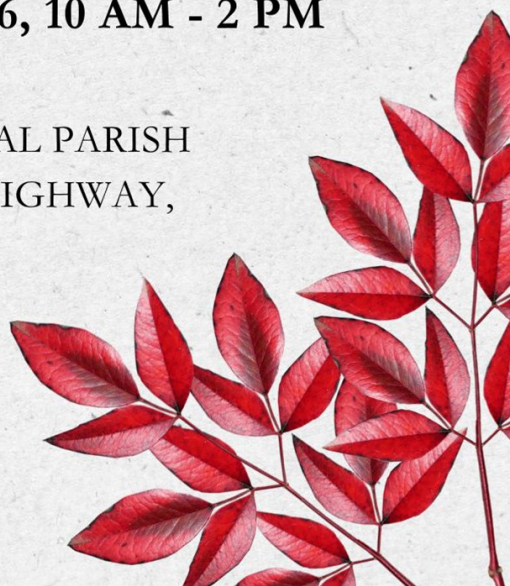
