#### My Dear Friends in Christ,

Please be sure to read the appeal that appears in the box below this letter.

Many of you know that I recently spent the good part of a week in the mountains of North Carolina at our Diocesan Youth Mission Camp. We filled an open session of a program designed and hosted by the Moravian Church at their camp and conference center, Laurel Ridge. There were 50 of us, altogether, and we spent 4.5 days working with and for residents of the community to restore homes, agencies, and lives. Our theme for the week was set by the Moravians, and we lived into it with our whole selves: From the Word to the World.

My job was to provide programming each night, following that theme. We considered Word, Work, Walk, and Way. Jesus is the Word who was with God in the beginning and was God, in whom all God's fullness was pleased to dwell. Our Work is service, which has to be undertaken together to reach its full impact. We Walk with Jesus, calling upon his name at each turning of the path we travel together. The Way of Jesus is our path, the road we walk with him, the manner of our living into the fullness of our salvation. Our ultimate destination is our own transformation for the transformation of the world, both by the power of the Holy Spirit.

From the Word to the World—I find that this theme sums up exactly my idea of the mission and purpose of Christ's one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church. Beginning in the Word, we become one, holy, and catholic. This is our purpose. In God's call to us, we are sent into the world on our apostolic mission—to love with the heart of Christ, to think with the mind of Christ, and to act in the world as the Body of Christ.

In this newsletter you will find resources to aid you in grounding your Work, your Walk, your Way in the Word. You will also find opportunities for being part of God's mission in the World. Let's pray and study, grow and live into the fullness of Christ together, and take his love into the world.

### Senior Warden's Report

August-September 2025



I know it is hard to believe but fall is upon us. The weather is still hot and humid, storms come and go but schools are starting in early August, including the Episcopal Day School. College students are excited about the start of the new semester. We will have the opportunity to welcome college students and their parents to Holy Trinity as they are on campus in mid-August. Please welcome all who come to Holy Trinity over the next few weeks with a smile and a friendly word that lets them know that we are a welcoming and caring community.

Mother Suz and the Call Committee continue to seek the leading of the Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, as they interview candidates for our assistant priest position. It has been 3 long years since we have had an assistant priest. Continue to pray that we will be led to the right person and the right person will be led to us in the days ahead.

We need volunteers to help our parish move forward. Although we are seeing more young families on Sunday mornings, our volunteer pool is continuing to age and decline. (I have another birthday coming up in September! And as my granddaughter says, "GrandMel, you are old!!)

Last year's Mutual Ministry Survey made it clear that many of you miss activities that have been held in the past. If you want to see new activities or old activities return, please put together your volunteer group and we will help you make it happen. The same volunteers don't need to do all the tasks. Many hands do indeed make light work. Holy Trinity is not the buildings and the grounds, it is the people. It is all of us, working together to love with the heart of Christ, think with the mind of Christ and act in the world as the body of Christ.

We will be welcoming The Rt. Reverend Daniel Richards to Holy Trinity on August 24, 2025. This will be his second official visit to Holy Trinity. When he came 2 years ago it was a day of celebration, and we anticipate another great day of celebration this year. We will have 8 of our parish to be confirmed during this visit, including 7 of our youth. Please plan to attend and support our confirmands if possible.

After the Bishop's visit, the next Saturday will be the first Clemson Football game of the year. And yes, it will be a real cat fight as the LSU Tigers and the Clemson Tigers meet in Memorial Stadium. Check the Football Parking sign up for your opportunity to volunteer on

game days this fall. It is a great opportunity to see how crazy game days are in Clemson while helping to support Holy Trinity and raise money to pay off the Trinity Place mortgage. Bob Taylor, our Treasurer appreciates your support with this task as do I.

Thursday, September 4 will be the opening day of St. Paul's Thrift Shop after being closed for 2 months. The Thrift Shop is run by volunteers and located on the property of St. Paul's Church in Pendleton. It is open from 10 am to 3 pm on Mondays and Thursdays and from 10 am to 1 pm on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of each month between September and June. For the past 3 years Judy Surak has been Thrift Shop's Chair and has done a wonderful job. She is stepping down and Margaret Nieman is now the Thrift Shop Chair. Judy has promised that she will continue to volunteer in the Thrift Shop. The Thrift Shop is another branch of our outreach as it provides a service to the community with low-cost items for sale and proceeds that are used to support projects in the local community as well as St Paul's. And if you are like me and have items that you no longer need or use that are in good condition you may donate them to the Thrift Shop when they are open and receive a receipt for your donation for tax purposes.

Please continue to pray for our world, our country, our state, our county and our community and Holy Trinity Parish and all those in leadership positions. So many people are angry, hurting, grieving, scared, hungry, and unable to afford decent housing. We can not be all things for all people but we can pray for all people and do small things every day to make a difference in someone's life.

#### St. Paul's Renovation



As is often the case with historic structures, launching the painting and restoration project for St. Paul's church in Pendleton has presented many challenges. Nevertheless, we continue to make progress as we are confronted with new issues that have taken immediate priority.

As a reminder, painting the exterior of the church was put on hold in 2024 due the need to replace the shingles on the roof (thankfully to be covered by insurance due to hail damage). In addition, adjacent trees that were damaged by Hurricane Helene and other summer storms had to be removed before work could begin.

We also noted the roof was visibly sagging in places which raised concern. A structural engineer was brought on site to complete an assessment of the overall structural integrity. After several visits, it was determined that the majority of the rafters are either cracked, or need to be reinforced to prevent cracking. The engineering analysis also found major issues with an upper truss and center beam. Bids have been issued, and we hope to move forward with these repairs in September. As soon as this work is completed, the shingles can then be replaced.


Certainly these are unexpected setbacks, but it now appears we are all set to move forward. The exterior painting will be re-bid in the month of August and is expected to begin in November, once the roof is repaired and the shingles are replaced.

Thank you for your patience, as well as the many generous gifts we have received for the St. Paul's Painting and Restoration Fund, which exceeds \$150,000 to date. The St. Paul's Committee is exploring grant opportunities to help cover the costs of the additional repairs, as well as some less urgent repair work that will require attention soon.

Please contact the church office if you wish to make a contribution to this critically important effort to preserve this special place of worship for future generations to come.

#### July 2025 Tempo Financial Report Bob Taylor, Treasurer

Mid-year is a good time to project end-of-the year finances and to begin plans for the 2026 financial budget. Total income and total expenses for the first half of 2025 are both behind budget with total income exceeding total expenses by \$9,729.00 through June 30. 2025. Pledge Offerings lagging behind in the summer are not unusual and are expected to catch up in the fall. Budgeted expenditures scheduled for the fall will also bring expenses close to budget in most operational accounts. Hence at mid-year, it appears that finances are close to being on track for the year. The following table provides additional detailed summaries of the financial data through June 30, 2025:



### The Season After Pentecost—Late Summer



Each year the long Season after Pentecost seems to really slow down as we enter the dog days of summer. Maybe it's the heat, but it can feel like we've been in this season forever! Our practice is to change things up liturgically as we approach the beginning of the program year, which roughly follows the academic calendar of public schools and Clemson University. As has been our tradition in recent years, we will have our annual Backpack Blessing on the first Sunday in August. All students and teachers are encouraged to bring your backpacks and receive a blessing for the beginning of the school year. We will also bless donated school supplies to be delivered to the Helping Hands Children's Shelter.

This year, Bishop Daniel will come to Holy Trinity to Confirm and Receive young and new Episcopalians at the end of August, so that seems like an opportune time to make the liturgical shift that will see us through the end of this liturgical year. Our choir will return from their summer hiatus the week before the bishop's visitation, so we will

have a sort of "dress rehearsal" of the shift from Eucharistic Prayer C to Eucharistic Prayer A, which is very familiar to most of us. We will also begin using Prayers of the People, Form IV. We will continue to use the Powell setting of the Gloria as our Song of Praise at the beginning of the liturgy, but the Sanctus and Fraction anthem will change, and we will use those settings until the beginning of the new liturgical year in December.

At this time, we do not have a Children's Choir Director hired to continue our program for children. Please pray faithfully that God will provide us with just the right person to lead this important part of our music ministry.

As this long, green Season after Pentecost continues, remember that the most effective way to grow in Christ is to come to church, pray and read the Bible regularly, and serve in his Name. The most effective way for the church to grow is for members to invite friends to come to worship or serve with them. We are all growing in Christ together as we work and walk in his Way!





### **Adult Formation Offerings: Fall 2025**



**The Sunday morning Adult Bible Study and Fellowship resumes on Sunday, September 14, 2025 at 9:30 AM in the Tom Davis Library.** In response to Bishop Daniel's "Bible in a Year Challenge," we continue our study of "The Path – A Journey Through the Bible" (Note: books are provided). Each Sunday, we discuss a section of the Bible guided by a chapter in" The Path." We will resume at Chapter 13, "Here am I; Send Me," which begins a study of the Prophets of the Old Testament. I've often struggled with the writings of the prophets. Reading the Bible this year is helping me learn the parallels between the narrative books of the Old Testament and God's word spoken through the prophets during that time. The wisdom of the prophets bears interesting relevance to many of our modern day challenges.

While each Chapter builds upon the previous week, you need not read the chapter or be reading the Bible to join Adult Sunday School. Consider joining us for Fellowship and lively discussion as we continue to seek Christian life skills in God's Word. **Ellen Haase** – Adult Sunday School leader

**Tuesday Morning Bible Study:** Our "Reflectionary" Bible study continues each Tuesday morning at 11:00 am, meeting by Zoom. The link will be included in HT Notes throughout the month of August, or you may contact the church office to receive it via email. No preparation is necessary. We read and respond to the appointed readings for the upcoming Sunday worship, asking questions and wondering together about the answers. The conversation usually lasts a little over an hour. The conversation is facilitated by Mtr. Suz.




**Sacred Ground Dialogue Series:** This series meets on alternate Thursday evenings at 6:00 pm for 7 sessions in the Fall and 6 sessions in the Spring, facilitated by Mtr. Suz. Feel free to invite friends from other de-



nominations or those of no affiliation. Sacred Ground is a sensitive, prayerful resource that creates space for difficult but respectful and transformative dialogue on race and racism. It invites participants to walk back through history in order to peel away the layers that brought us to today, reflecting on family histories and stories, as well as important narratives that shape the collective American story. It holds as a guiding star the vision of beloved community – where all people are honored and protected and nurtured as beloved children of God, where we weep at one another's pain and seek one another's


